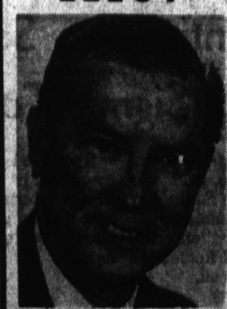
## Big Bear Trip
