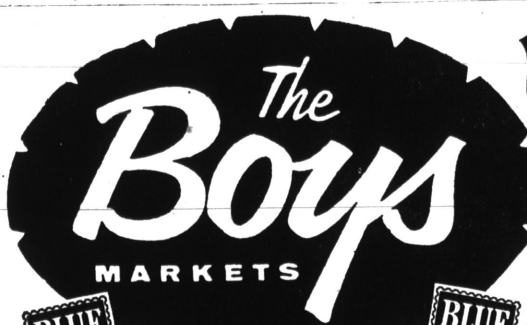
The German Shorthair Pointer tips the scales at about 65 pounds and in height 23 inches.
