Lieutenant Carron said it was decided to have the in-quest to see if anyone is criminally responsible for the accident inasmuch as so many were injured and so many were involved.

Thirteen of the fourteen persons in the four autonobiles lived in Torrance. Killed were William De-Waide, 19, of 21918 Linda Drive; Grant Alan Matthews, 20, of 20836 Dalton St.; Cheryll Terry, 14, of 4626 Cathann St.; and Paul T. Reed, 19, of 216 South Hel-berts, Redondo Beach.
