Coffee Break

After reading the headline, "Beware of the Omnivorous Looper!" which was reported last seen invading suburban neighborhoods like ours, my first reaction was to call in the kids and lock the doors and windows.

But I should know by now not to become unduly alarmed by stories I read in the garden sections of newspapers and magazines. For, as it turned out, the Omnivorous Looper, though an insect with a hearty appetite for plant life, is hardly in the same class with the creature from the deep lagoon.

One thing I've noticed about garden experts is that they are in direct contrast to those happy souls who put out seed catalogues. For they are incurable optimists who delight in showing pictures of heautiful fruit trees, loaded with wax-like peaches, pears, plums, and cherries. And the beauty of it, according to the directions on the packet, is that they can be grown in anybody's back yard.

On the other hand, garden experts are harbingers of gloom who are forever discussing fungus diseases, dry rot, prickly scales, defoliation, be-sides thousands of different kinds of insects ready to lay waste to everything you plant, unless you keep them under control with a dozen different types of spray.

And should a reader write in for information about a delinquent plant, a typical reply would be. "I advise you to see your family tree surgeon at

They also love to drop tidbits of information, guaranteed to keep you awake nights. For example, the garden expert will warn you not to apply spray to any of those wonderful, hurd-working little Hover flies. They're on our side, you see. What worries me is how you tell the difference between the Omnivorous Looper and the Hover fly?

But as far as "horror stories" go, the garden experts are best in describing the various ways your lawn is likely to die this summer. Either from overwatering or underwatering. Too much fertilizer or not enough. Too much sun or too much

shade. Soil too sandy and too much like clay.

Then there are the umpteen varieties of weeds, waiting like the hordes of Attils the Hun, to take over unless you uproot them in time. But another problem we have is keeping straight which are the weeds and which are the plants, because the insects keep eating up the identifying tags off our plants.
