

Dealers Hammer Out New Car Theft Policy

Members of the Torrance Motor Car Dealers Association have agreed upon a new, get-tough policy toward car thieves who direct their efforts at car lots.

Each member dealer resolved to do all in his power to prosecute and convict persons charged with thefts from their respective businesses. They also promised to institute civil suits against responsible parties in order to pin financial as well as criminal responsibility on car thieves.

The new policy was hammered out at a recent meeting with representatives of the Torrance Police Department.

Streets to Close On Parade Route

Crosstown traffic will be restricted, and parking prohibited, in many areas of Torrance Saturday because of the ninth annual Armed Forces Day Parade, according to Lt. D. C. Cook, commander of the traffic division, Torrance Police Department.

The parade will move from the marshaling area at the corner of El Prado and Cravens Avenue to Torrance Boulevard, then west to Madrona Avenue and the dispersal area.

Any vehicle parked in violation along the parade route, marshaling area and dispersal area will be cited and towed away at owner's expense.

THE PARADE will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday and the following streets along the parade route will be closed to traffic at the indicated times.

Marshaling area streets will close at 8 a.m. These include Cravens Avenue between Torrance Boulevard and Marcelina Avenue; Engracia Avenue, Post Avenue and El Prado Avenue at Cravens Avenue; El Prado Avenue between Carson Street and Cravens Avenue; Arlington Avenue between Marcelina Avenue and Post Avenue; and Manuel Avenue between Post Avenue and Carson Street.

At 9 a.m. in the dispersal area, Madrona Avenue will be closed between Carson and Emerald Streets.

At 10 a.m. Torrance Boulevard will be closed to traffic, as well as all north-south streets crossing Torrance Boulevard, between Amie Avenue and Cravens Avenue. These streets will remain closed until after the parade has passed. The parade dispersal area on Madrona Avenue and on Torrance Boulevard west to Amie Street will remain closed until approximately 1 p.m.

Public transportation vehicles and emergency equipment have been notified of street closings. Provisions have been made for emergency access into the parade area if required.

Suggested alternate routes during parade time will be Hawthorne Boulevard and Western Avenue for north-south traffic and Carson Street or 190th Street for east-west traffic.

\$20,000 Taken by Thieves

Burglars cut through a single cylinder lock to gain entrance to the main branch of the Torrance Post Office, 2510 Monterey St., carting off an estimated \$20,000 in cash, stamps, and money orders sometime Saturday night or Sunday morning.

Torrance police said the burglars used a metal saw to remove the face of the cylinder lock which deadbolts the glass doors separating the outer lobby from the window lobby, then jumped over the counter into the main processing area.

The unknown suspects headed for the main vault, first attempting to break in through an adjacent wall with a sledge hammer, but resorting to the use of an acetylene torch when they found the wall was made of reinforced concrete.

Assistant Postmaster Paul Schwartzhoff said he believes the job was done by seasoned professionals, judging from the precise way in which the torch was used to open the vault.

Burglars then moved on to a safe in the southeast corner of the main processing area.

Post Office employees arriving at 8:30 a.m. Sunday morning discovered the burglary.

Kennedy To Speak Thursday

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy will address the public Thursday at 12:15 p.m. in the northwest corner of TRW's Space Park facility, Aviation and Compton Boulevards, Redondo Beach.

Fireworks Stands Get Approval

City Councilmen assured Torrance residents a wild Fourth of July last night by voting to permit the operation of 32 fireworks stands within city limits this year.

In order to grant the 32 permits, however, the council had to ease city code restrictions, which draw the line at 27 fireworks stands.

The code states that no more than one stand permit shall be issued for each 5,000 local residents, based on a population figure of 131,744.

COUNCILMEN gave reluctant approval to all applicants, but expressed concern over the ever-increasing number of permit requests. A committee composed of Mayor Albert Isen, and Councilmen Jay Beasley and Orin Johnson was assigned to review the problem and suggest a way to trim down the list.

"We have gone far, far afield from the original intention of the code provisions," Mayor Isen said, pointing out that revenue from fireworks sales was meant to benefit veterans' organizations such as the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Disabled Veterans. None of these groups appears on this year's list.

The law was extended to include organizations concerned with civic betterment and charity so that the list of groups now applying for permits includes Boy Scouts units, Little League Organizations, and the Knights of Columbus.

COUNCILMEN expressed concern over the fact that too many stands would spread the profits to thin, but they didn't feel they could cut the list arbitrarily.

Councilmen Ken Miller said he wasn't worried so much about the 32 stands this year as he was about the 36 or more groups that might apply next year. Only 29 groups applied last year.

Miller said that the problem might solve itself, however, through a natural competitive selection.
