(Continued from Page 1) city that it would be impossible for the Navy to grant the 15-foot easement because of "accelerated Naval involvement in Southeast Asia" and the Navy's anticipated need for the Annex property.

Both Sen. Thomas Kuchel and Rep. Cecil King attempted to influence the Navy Department in making a favorable decision, at the request of City Manager Ferraro. The question went as high as Undersecretary of the Navy Charles F. Baird before a negative response was handed down.

City engineers have variations of the plan, however, that may permit elimination of the Madrona spur after all. One possibility, Nollac explained, would be to run the new spur in the middle of Jefferson Street, immediately north of the Naval Annex, as a temporary measure until the Annex property became available.

If the situation in Vietnam improves, the Navy may decide the narrow strip of territory is not vital to Annex operations and permit the easement, Nollac said.

Car Wash To Benefit Victim

Torrance High students are planning to hold a benefit car wash to help defray hospital expenses for an 18-year-old youth who was critically injured in a traffic accident April 6.

Sponsored by the junior and senior classes, the car wash will take place Sunday, May 26, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Torrance Family YMCA on Sepulveda Boulevard.

Proceeds will be given to the family of Kenneth Goins, 2205 Gramercy Ave., who has been at Bay Harbor Hospital for the past six weeks. Goins was unconscious for nearly five weeks following the accident which took the lives of three Torrance youths.

A portion of the proceeds will also be used to help purchase a memorial plaque for Mike Branstetter, 18, one of those killed in the smashup near Blythe, Calif.

The rejection of both the 8 per cent pay request and the use of a mediator would influence TEA in subsequent approaches to protest action.

Mrs. Polly Watts, a board member who has expressed concern over voter reaction to a large pay increase, particularly in view of November's tax override, made the motion that the salary item again be referred to the negotiations Council.

THE NEGOTIATIONS Council is composed of Dr. Morton, acting for the administration,

and faculty representatives with varying viewpoints. John Conway, president of the council, expressed reluctance to meet again with Dr. Morton inasmuch as his (Dr. Morton's) recommendations have not influenced the board members.

Board President Dr. Owen Griffith reiterated again that under the state's Winton Act, the board is neither legally or morally bound by recommendations of the Negotiations Council.

Hi-Shear Breaks Records

George S. Wing, chairman and president of Hi-Shear Corporation, has announced operating results of the design and producer of fastening system and ordnance devices for the fiscal year ended February 29, 1968.

For the fiscal year just ended, both sales and income again set historic new highs, marking the sixth consecutive year of record-breaking sales and the fifth year in a row for gains in income.

Net income for the fiscal year ended February 29, 1968, was \$1,586,000, equal to \$2.02 per common share. This represents a gain of 23 per cent over net income of \$1,270,995, equal to \$1.63 per share for the prior fiscal year. Pre-share figures are computed on 785,685 shares, the average number of common shares outstanding during the fiscal year just ended.

Net sales for the fiscal year just ended were \$23,326,260, up 32 per cent over net sales of \$17,581,373 for the previous fiscal year.

Backlog of orders stood at \$15 million on February 29, 1968, up substantially from \$3 million at the prior fiscal year end.
