### Raceway Expansion

A 3.6 million multi-purpose construction project at Riverside International Raceway has been announced by Les Richter, president of the Southern California auto racing facility.

"Plans for a high-speed, banked, mile and one-half tri-oval," stated Richter, "are in the final stages. The oval can be used separately and as a portion of the Raceway's existing courses."

"Construction will begin as soon as we have blueprints. All attempts will be made to complete work by Sept. 1 when the Mission Bell Trophy race for Trans-American sedans is scheduled the following weekend," said Richter.

Installation of 27,000 permanent grandstand seats, an extensive beautification project and a working press area are planned.

"We hope to make an announcement in the near future about the addition of two premier events," said the former Ram football player.

"These dates would be for a United States Auto Club (USAC) championship car race and a National Association of Stock Car Auto Racing (NASCAR) event for Grand National machines."

"The addition of the tri-oval USAC and NASCAR dates to our already outstanding road racing calendar," Richter said, "will clearly establish Riverside as having the most comprehensive schedule of major league motor sports events in the world."

According to the presentation, the 27,000 grandstand seats will be located in three areas: 15,000 along the start/finish line with a view of both the tri-oval and the road course and 6,000 each at turn six and in the "esses."

Infield parking and temporary grandstand structures will swell spectator capacity above the 100,000 level at major events.

A large working press facility, accommodating reporters from newspapers, television and radio, will be positioned atop the permanent grandstand at start/finish. Restroom and food service areas will be incorporated into the separate press structure.

A provision has been made for a luxurious, membership stadium club dining and lounge area.

"Upon completion," emphasized Raceway General Manager Roy Hord, the man who will supervise the work, "We feel these additions will underline Riverside's position as the one truly multi-purpose motor sports facility in existence."

Beautification plans call for shade and ground-cover to be planted throughout most of the 600-acre Raceway property located five miles east of Riverside on U.S. Highways 60 and 395.

Shade trees and roofed spectator treas, as well as a number of permanent sanitary facilities, are incorporated into this phase of the construction expenditure. Shrubbery will border access roads and parking areas will be redefined and paved.

"This is not a pipe dream or a trial balloon," concluded Richter. "It's something we've been working on and building toward for a long time. It conforms with our master plan projection announced several years ago."

Approval of the project was granted April 29 by the Riverside International Raceway Board of Directors, including Claude Cameron, Don Ford, Bob Hope, Ernest Johnson, Fred Levy, Jr., R. G. Lewis, Edwin W. Pauley, Robert E. Petersen, W. R. Pagen and Richter.

### Spartans Down Notre Dame, 5-2

Catholic League champion Notre Dame, winner of 13 straight league and CIF playoff games, was a 5-2 loser to South High yesterday in the second round of the playoffs. South plays Rolling Hills on Friday.

The Spartans ran up a 5-0 lead in the fourth inning for winning pitcher Wade Linstad. But Linstad had to be rescued in the sixth when the Fighting Irish scored two runs and had the bases loaded with no outs.

Dick Foulk, who pitched a 4-1 win over Sunny Hills on Friday, was the hero again in relief. He retired the side on two strikeouts and a pop fly.

South scored two runs in the first inning on a walk to Dan Pace, a single by Jeff Wang, fielder's choice hit by Steve Trudell, and a pair of bases on balls to Steve Shrader and Steve Lehto.

In the fifth inning Pace singled and scored behind Jeff Wang whose drive to left field went through on a shoe-string attempt. Before the inning was over Brent Barron and Shrader belted back-to-back triples.

Three straight hits, including a run producing drive to right center by Frank Foli, gave Notre Dame its first run in the sixth. An error loaded the bases and Jim Valla walked for the second tally.

Pitcher Linstad was replaced by Foulk who zipped the ball at the Irish with razor-sharp control.

It was not until two outs in the seventh that he gave up a walk and a single to left. Catcher Bob Larabell grounded out to first to end the game.


Until he was kayoed in the sixth, Linstad pitched one-hit ball and had walked two. He fanned seven.

South bunched two hits in the first inning and four in the fourth inning against Chuck Vella, but the right-hander gave up only a single to Jeff Wang thereafter. Wang had three hits to go with his home run Friday.

Rolling Hills defeated Thousand Oaks, 5-4, in eight innings of their second round game. The site of the South-Rolling Hills game was not available at press time.

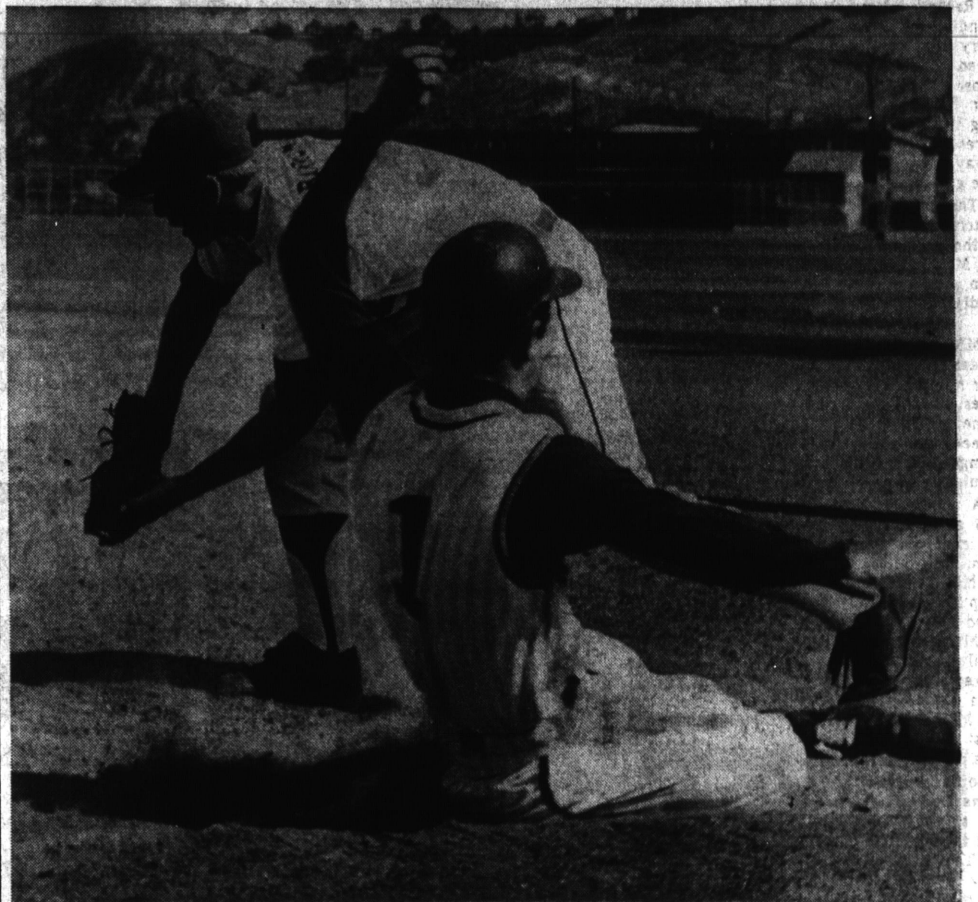

### Long Beach Eyes State Baseball Title

The Long Beach City College Vikings won the Southern California baseball championship last week and face Sacramento City College this week for the state championship.

The Vikings will host Sacramento in a best-of-three series at Blair Field in Long Beach Friday and Saturday. If the games are even, a doubleheader will be played Saturday following the first game.

Last week, the Vikings easily defeated Chaffey College, 14-7, at Chaffey and 11-2 at Long Beach in the final game.

Left-hander Darryl Thomas, the Metropolitan Conference's leading pitcher, picked up his 13th win of the year Friday, despite winds that buffeted the Chaffey diamond up to 30 miles per hour at times.

Thomas, whose ERA of 0.21 was a Metro record this year, walked 10 batters, but struck out 10 more as the Vikings pounded out a season high of 21 hits, including five by catcher Steve Trulligatto in easily handling the Panthers.

Saturday, it was almost the same story, but freshman Tim Brady, who had but a 1-1 record going into the game, pitched seven strong innings before being hit on the hand by a Bruce Olson pitch and had to leave the game.

The Vikings collected 15 hits. Rightfielder Russ Bennett had the big day, going five for five, scoring three runs and driving in another three.

### City Basketball Allstars Selected

Los Angeles City team coach Jim Ryan has announced selections of his players for the First Annual Southern California All-Star Prep Basketball Classic July 10 at the Forum.

The L.A. City team will face the C.I.F. Southern Section 3-A all-stars in the featured game of a doubleheader, with the C.I.F.-S.S. 2-A meeting its 1-A counterpart in the first contest.

Proceeds of the doubleheader will be divided between co-sponsors, Manhattan Beach Lions Club and Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association (S.C.I.B.C.A.).

Ryan, who directed Manual Arts to the city title and is now coaching at new Crenshaw High, tabbed two of his Manual stars, forward Mose Adolph and guard Willie Allen, along with All-City "Player of the Year" Ron Shaw, center from Jordan, forward Sam Martin and guard

Lenzy Stuart from Roosevelt's city runners-up team.

Riley (6-8, 185) averaged 21.9 points a game and had an 88 per cent field goal percentage.

Stuart (6-4, 170) is a slick ball-handler who was all-league for three years, averaged 21.5 points as a senior.

Martin (6-3, 185), two years All-City, hit at a 21.0 clip.

Allen (5-9, 141) and Adolph (6-0, 160) were the "quarterbacks" of the city champions.

Mose, first team All-City, scored 18.1 ppg and Willie, All-Southern League, had a 17.0 mark.

Jefferson's John Clark (6-1, 175), who finished with a 30.0 average, will be used as a forward for the L.A. City all-stars.

Second team All-City picks are center Dave Hullman (6-8, 205), University, and Steve Shaw (6-5, 190), Gardena, and forward-center Don Strong (6-3, 170), Fremont, Hullman

averaged 23.2 points, Strong, 16.9, and Shaw, 16.1.

Forward Gary Matthews (6-1, 184) of San Fernando, who had a 19.6 point scoring average, was selected on third team All-City.

For the other two spots on his 12-man team, Ryan chose center Scott English (6-4, 190), All-West Valley at Chatsworth (20.2 average), and forward Vincent Greene (6-2, 165), All-Southern League at Washington (20.3 average).
