

More Students, Fewer Jobs Seen During Coming Year

This summer there's going to be a bumper crop of students seeking employment and a scarcity of jobs. Any high school or college student planning to work during the summer recess would be wise to get his applications in right now.

According to the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics there will be 300,000 more young people between the ages of 16 and 21 flooding the summer job market this year than there were in 1967. All told, 3.8 million new workers will be on the scene and of this total 2.8 million represent applicants for summer jobs.

Employment offices at high schools and colleges can open doors for students. High schoolers are advised to see the school counselor and collegians should visit the campus employment office. Another area for summer jobs is the local office of the state employment service. Here a student can be advised of any openings and be registered for future openings.

PRIVATE businesses will be the best source of employment. Job openings will be for store clerks and helpers, hotel and motel workers, construction helpers, waiters and waitresses, workers in dry-cleaning plants and laundries, bank or insurance clerks, typist and camp counselors.

One bright spot is the optimism voiced by the President's Council on Youth Opportunity. It hopes "or 294,000 summer jobs for youngsters through federal, state and local governments. State employment offices should be visited for these jobs.

Students applying for jobs are advised to dress neatly and be well groomed. Answering questions thoughtfully and highlighting special skills such as typing or mechanical ability also enhance job chances.

The B. F. Goodrich Co. has come up with an answer — a unique spare tire that folds up on its rim when inflated, but unfolds to standard size when inflated with a can of compressed gas. Use of a deflated "Space Saver Spare" tire in place of a conventional spare results in an additional three cubic feet of available trunk room, enough to accommodate an average-size suitcase, according to the company.

The tire will provide 2,000 miles or more of normal driving, more than enough to furnish emergency service over the life of most passenger cars. It has been cited by "Motor Trend" magazine as "a significant achievement in design and a real contribution to the automotive industry," and now comes as standard equipment on the 1968 Pontiac Firebird and American Motors' new AMX sports car. The tire is also available through BFG dealers and retail stores.

A NEW BOOK by A. M. Watkins, "How to Avoid the Traps" (Meredith Press) offers down-to-earth, time-saving tips for househunters. by the huge proportions of the new, 500-passenger Boeing 747 airliner.

Among the new machines built to work on the 747's sub-assemblies is a numerically-controlled drill riveter developed by Ozark Industries' aerospace tool division, that

will install some 2,000 fasteners on the 28-foot-long wing fuel tanks of the super liner, and do it fully automatically.

THE machine, believed to be the largest riveter of its kind ever built, weighs more than 30 tons and is equipped

with a 40-foot track system along which the 5,000-pound section being fabricated is transported to the riveting head and placed in exact position for riveting.

All performance instructions for the complex operation is programmed on a sin-

gle role of perforated tape. As soon as one fastener is riveted in place the fuel tank as automatically rotated, elevated or tilted into position for the next rivet to be installed.

In marked contrast with the giant riveter is a grinding machine Omark recently intro-

duced to the aerospace industry. It's equipped with a magnifying system for making points on drills as thin as a needle.

TV ADDICTS are finally getting a break. A new device called the "Equalizer" has

been developed and reported to eliminate the increase in volume when the commercials come on. The device is at-

tached to the speaker by two wires and then placed on top of the TV set. It automatically absorbs any excess sound coming from the trans-

former before it enters the speaker. A new ratchet screwdriver is available and the manufacturer claims it can drive the most stubborn screws with ease, reducing hand fatigue and speeding up the insertion of any type of screw.
