(Continued from page A-1) testing the primary. They are Stanley L. Leonard of Palos Verdes and Joe Reichmann of Los Angeles.

Incumbents in all three Assembly Districts which cut through the city are opposed in the primary.

In the 46th District, Robert G. Beverly, a Republican is being opposed by Stan Boggs of Palos Verdes. Democratic ballots will list James C. Roberts of Redondo Beach and Warren H. Scherich of Palos Verdes.

ASSEMBLYMAN L. E. (Larry) Townsend, a Democrat, faces two challengers in the 67th Assembly District. They are Al Apodaca of Los Angeles and Walter C. Dworschak of Gardena.

Torrance Realtor Fred Fredericks is seeking the Republican nomination in the 67th District. He is opposed by Tom Tomlin, the GOP candidate in 1966.

In the 68th Assembly District, veteran Assemblyman Vincent Thomas has been challenged by Ed Guerrero, a San Pedro businessman, in the Democratic primary. Republican Paul R. Lookinland of San Pedro is unopposed.

Major interest in the U. S. Senate races have centered on the Republican contest between Senator Thomas Kuchel and Dr. Max Rafferty, state superintendent of public instruction.

Alan Cranston, former state controller, is considered the front-runner for the Democratic nod.

JUDGE George R. Perkovich Jr. of the South Bay Municipal Court is seeking re-election in a non-partisan race which has attracted two candidates. They are Eric Rafter, an attorney from Hermosa Beach, and Everett Jones, a Lomita attorney.

Two incumbent supervisors have been challenged in non-partisan races. Supervisor Kenneth Hahn is facing Los Angeles Councilman Billy Mills for the Second District seat, while Burton W. Chace has been challenged by William T. Charvet in his bid for re-election in the Fourth District.

District Attorney Evelle J. Younger, seeking his second term, has been challenged by Michael Hannon, an attorney.

TWO STATE bond issues also are on the primary ballot. They include a \$200 million Veterans Bond Act and a \$65 million junior college bond.

The Press-Herald, in editorial today recommends that Judge Perkovich be re-elected and that the Veterans' Bond Act be approved. A No vote is recommended on the junior college bond issue.

In previous editions, the Press-Herald has recommended the re-election of Supervisors Kenneth Hahn and Burton Chace and District Attorney Evelle J. Younger.
