Supervisors Proclaim 'Beach Safety Week'

County supervisors have joined with the Surf Life Saving Association in proclaiming this week "Beach Safety Week."

On the motion of Burton W. Chace, who represents all of the county's 67-mile coastline, supervisors commended the association's safety program in proclaiming the week long observance.

"The safety campaign is aimed at calling the beachgoers' attention to the many hazards which may accom-

pany careless use of our beaches," Chace said.

"Swimming in the surf can be fun, but it becomes dangerous if the swimmer does not know the rules of basic water safety," he said.

The association has scheduled an open house Saturday from 1 to 6 p.m. at County Lifeguard Headquarters, 1101 Strand, Redondo Beach. The program includes a tour of the station, equipment displays, a film and a lecture on rip tides.

Aisenson Backed by Attorneys

Municipal Judge David J. Aisenson is the clear cut choice of members of the Los Angeles County Bar Association for Judge of the Superior Court, Office No. 5, in the June 4 primary election.

Of the 4,325 votes cast by the county's lawyers and judges, Judge Aisenson was named on 1,811 or 43 per cent of the ballots. He easily outdistanced his three opponents for the office with a 535-vote margin over the runner-up candidate.

"I am pleased, flattered and humbled by the honor paid me by my colleagues in the legal community," the 44-year-old jurist said.

"I HAVE always felt," he explained, "that lawyers and judges are in a unique position to pass on the qualifications of candidates for judicial offices because of their working knowledge of the backgrounds and temperaments of those seeking election."

Prior to his being elected to the bench in 1966, by a margin of 110,000 votes, Judge Aisenson served for more than four years as a Superior Court Commissioner and before that as a senior trial deputy in the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office.

HE WAS an associate professor at the University of San Fernando Valley College of Law and lectured at the Los Angeles Police Academy on nuisance abatement matters, search warrants, preparation of police reports, and search and seizure problems.
