Birthday Saturday

Mrs. Phoebe Sykes, who rounded out 100 years of living on May 25, was guest of honor at an Open House Saturday afternoon, given by her son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. William Sykes at their home, 1521 Cota Ave.

Born in Huddersfield, England, May 25, 1868, the birthday celebrant, with her husband and son, came to Torrance "before there was a Torrance," in October 1911, settling in what was

then known as Lomita. The following year, Mr.

Mrs. Sykes operated a tent store at Five Points, Carson and Cabrillo, where National Supply now stands. She then opened a cigar and candy store in the old Pacific Electric station and operated the concession until 1924 when she soid out.

In 1918, when he was 21 years old, William Sykes bought the nome at 1521 Cota from Jared Torrance, founder of the city of Torrance, Seven years ago, William was married and the Cota Avenue house is home for the threesome, At Saturday's party from 2 until 4 p.m., over 80 long-time friends called to congratulate Mrs. Sykes.
