## Townsend Names Chairmen For Assembly Campaign

Assemblyman L. E. (Larry) Townsend (D-67th District) has announced the appointment of Max Kelly, Torrance school teacher as Torrance chairman of the Committee to Re-elect Townsend.

Also named this week to head up the "Youth for Townsend Committee," was Rick Garcia of Torrance.

Named to assist Kelly in the campaign was John Billings, who will serve as co-chairman during the campaign.

CHAIRMEN met recently at a "Time for Fun Dance," which officially kicked off Townsend's bid for re-election. The dance was sponsored by "The Women's Committee to Re-elect Townsend."

Townsend named Lawndale City Councilman Arthur Griffin as district chairman of his campaign for re-election. Griffin, along with local chairmen in Gardena, Torrance, Hawthorne, and Lawndale will coordinate the campaign.

In the Gardena area, Dr. L. W. Umphrey will head up Townsend's campaign, with Hawthorne Councilman Greg

Page in charge of the northern section of the district.

JIM SCHAPERS, a member of the Lawndale Board of Education has pledged his support to the re-election of the assemblyman and will serve as chairman in that area.

Lawndale School Board President Louis Ramirez will serve as Townsend's campaign coordinator for "The Mexican-American Voters to Re-elect Townsend."

In the newly incorporated city of Carson, Councilman John Junk will serve as campaign chairman.

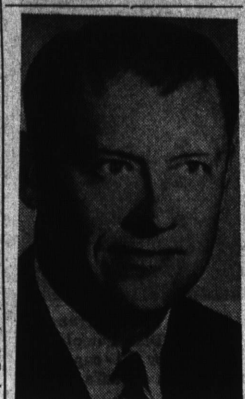
Miss DeCamp has chalked up 25 years of political experience to her credit. She was a close ally of Glenn Anderson during much of this time.

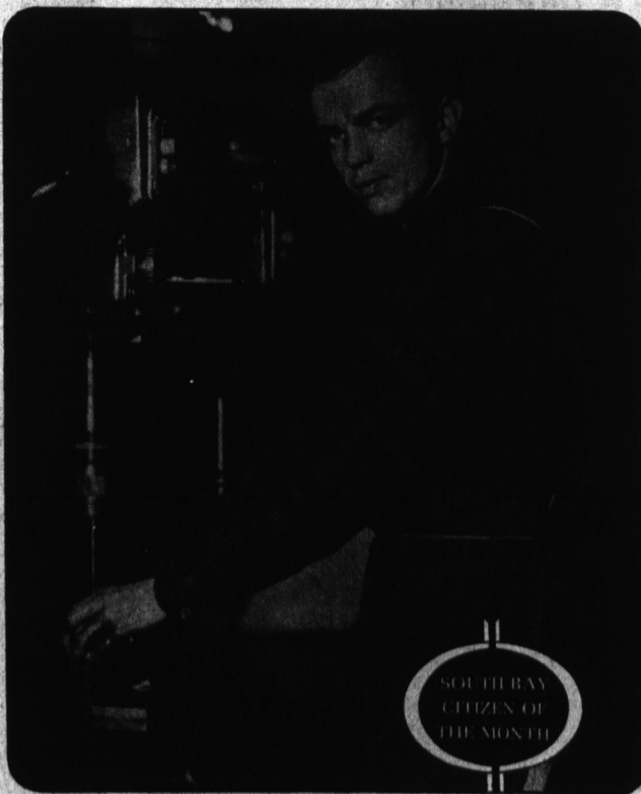
