



Place of Honor Reserved For Founder's Portrait

A portrait of Mrs. Frances Young, founder of the South Coast Botanic Garden, was presented to Garden Foundation members at the recent annual meeting by Dr. Paul Saffo, vice president.

The portrait, commissioned by the Foundation, was painted by Larry Finley of Palos Verdes. It will be on view at the Los Angeles County Arboretum until the proposed Hall of Horticulture is built at the South Coast Botanic Garden, 26701 Rolling Hills Road, Palos Verdes Peninsula.

Dr. Saffo praised Mrs. Young's "amazing power of iron will," noting that the 87-acre garden could never have been realized without her efforts.

SUPERVISOR Burton W. Chace, who worked closely with Mrs. Young in winning acceptance for the garden, was on hand to extend his congratulations.

Also present to honor Mrs. Young was Dr. William Stewart, director of the Los Angeles County Department of Arboreta and Botanic Gardens.

Mrs. Young reported to Foundation members that 3,000 volunteer hours and some \$75,000 were donated toward the garden this year. Work was begun on a central man-made lake and stream and a

children's grove of 30 red-wood trees.

HIGHLIGHTS of the last year were given by Donald Woolley, superintendent of the garden. Woolley noted that more than 3,100 tons of Palos Verdes stone were removed from the lake bottom at the garden and placed along the walls of the stream and its environs by Paul Kasper of the County Engineers. Some 4,600 tons of another variety of Palos Verdes stone were received during the holidays to line the lake shores.

Pumps for the stream should be in use before fall, Woolley commented.

The weather station at the garden is now complete, with the addition of an anemometer donated by Foundation members.

More than 17,000 persons visited the garden, free of charge, last year. The garden is open to the public four days a week, Thursdays and Fridays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., and Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.
