Miss Schwartz will enroll at Chico State College. Her grade point is 3.8.

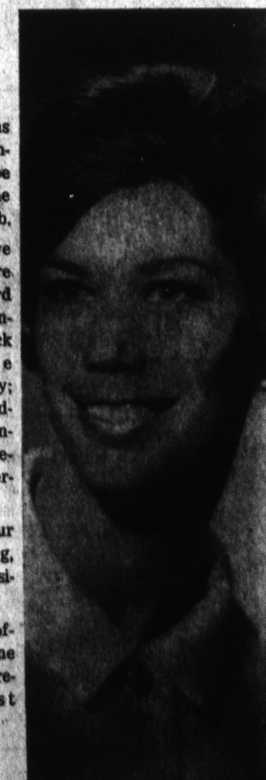
Runners-up for the schol-
