Square hats, robes, diplomas, it's that time of the year again. Graduation is an important event and it becomes even more important if family, friends, and relatives attend. RTD can make his or her graduation extra special by providing the transportation for you to attend. RTD's lines service dozens of schools in 4 counties, and just possibly the school you are interested in. Send for a system map and plan to attend. It will bring back some fond memories.

June 1st, the RTD started offering tokens at 25 for \$7.00. This provides a saving of 2c per ride and eliminates much of the need for cash. Tokens will not replace the monthly pass, but rather, provide the person who rides occasionally with a saving, too. The tokens will NOT be sold by the bus operators, but only at the District's ticket offices. Send for a brochure of agencies that handle tokens and monthly passes in your area.

Mother had her day: now it's Dad's turn. This is the time of the year Dad gets to do the dishes after the meal in his honor. I remember last year, instead of eating at home, they took me out, and I paid the bill. This year you take Dad to Knott's Berry Farm for a mouth watering chicken dinner and some of that boysenberry pie. You might even take him to Ports O' Call Village, with its many fine restaurants and shops. Dad isn't going to fuss over your choice, as long as you want to take him. Send for a system map and let RTD take the worry out of getting there.

Q. How close can I come to Loma Alta Drive in Altadena from Crenshaw and Manchester in Englewood? I have never taken a bus trip that required transfers. Will you explain how it works. D.W.

A. Take the 85 bus on Crenshaw to Hollywood and Vine, transfer to the 31 line to Fair Oaks in Pasadena and then transfer north on the 109 line to Loma Alta. Now about transferring when you board the 85 bus, ask the operator for a transfer. This will cost you 5c. When you get on the 31 line, ask that operator for a transfer to the 109 line. No charge is made for a transfer in Pasadena.

Q. Can I go to Disneyland and Knott's Berry Farm from Market and Manchester? What buses do I take to the Zoo? Please send me a Zoo folder and a map. Mrs. C. W.

A. Take the 5 line to 6th and Broadway, walk or ride to the new terminal and take the 58 line to both Knott's and Disneyland. For the Zoo, take the 5 line to Vermont, transfer to the 95 to Sunset Boulevard and the 23 to the Zoo. I'll send your folder and map.

Q. Will you tell me if there is a place in Inglewood that I can get a card for fare reduction. I am a senior citizen. Also, please send me a map.

A. You can get your ID Card at Rogers Park, 621 No. La Brea, Inglewood. Your map is on its way.

Q. How can I get from Lennox and Hawthorne to Rodeo and La Brea, also Hollywood and Vine? Mrs. O.N.

A. Take the 5 line to Lamert and Crenshaw, transfer to the 27 to Rodeo and La Brea. To get to Hollywood and Vine, ride the 5 to Crenshaw and transfer to the 85 to Vine Street.

Behind the Scenes Effort Assures Us Healthy Milk

Many services are taken for granted there days. Take, as an example, the milk you and your children drink daily.

Probably the only concern you have in purchasing milk are its taste and its freshness. You take for granted the fact that the milk is safe, clean, and wholesome.

There is a group working for you, however, which can't take this matter for granted.

The Dairy Inspection Services of the County Health Department is the "behind the scenes" force which makes certain the milk sold in this county is safe.

With the cooperation of the dairies, this team inspects and tests milk in this county and in five other counties which serve Los Angeles County's dairy needs.

IN ADDITION to issuing permits and inspecting 230 dairies here, the Health Department inspects and tests

250 milk farms in Tulare County, 150 in Kings County, 50 in Madera County, and 100 in Merced County.

These inspections are carried out by contract, with the milk industry reimbursing the County.

This county is the largest consumer of milk in the state, with our residents consuming nearly one million gallons daily. In addition, more than

500,000 gallons come here daily for processing.

Last year, the Health Department spent 14,000 inspection hours in 785 dairies, examining 200,000 cows for common ailments. Some 135 pasteurizing plants in the county required 3,500 inspections, and more than 28,000 samples were analyzed in the laboratories.

It is fitting that during June, proclaimed Dairy Month by the Board of Supervisors,

the public's attention is called to the diligent role played by the Health Department.

If strict enforcement were not maintained, milk could easily become contaminated and cause widespread outbreaks of such diseases as diphtheria, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, and other ailments.

AT SOUTH BAY club, the Torrance Rotary, performed quite a humanitarian service

to some needy children last weekend.

Civic and service groups do many worthwhile things, and this group not only performed a worthwhile service, but a unique one.

The Rotary Club staged a picnic at Marineland, bringing together adoptable children with special needs and prospective parents. The club picked up the bill for picnic lunches and admissions to the shows.
