## Current Building Projects Outlined at ECT Meeting

Dr. Walter Buettgenbach, director of educational facilities for the Torrance Unified School District, presented a report Monday on current construction projects within the district at the final meeting of the 1967-68 school year of the Educational Council of Torrance.

Projects currently under way include the North High School Industrial Arts Building and West High's Student Service Center which will be ready this fall, additions to Hickory Elementary School and Madrona Elementary School, a new auto shop at South High School's science

facilities, and lockers at elementary schools, textbook storage space at various schools, and additions of portable classrooms to handle temporary enrollment problems.

Other projects currently on the boards include construction of a new baseball field for Torrance High School, complete rehabilitation of the track at North High School, and purchase of a new school site at 231st Street and Arlington.

In addition, the Board of Education has awarded a contract for additions to the multipurpose building and a new restroom facility at Columbia School. Bids are being received for construction of a new classroom building and a library complex at Torrance High School, and for additional bleachers for North High's athletic field.

Also in the planning stage are additional classrooms at West and North High, additions to the Student Service Centers at seven elementary schools, and additions to the District Service Center.

Other proposed projects which have to be considered, according to Dr. Buettgenbach, are rehabilitation of

North High's multipurpose building, Torrance High's old main classroom building, one complete new elementary school, and additional classrooms for several elementary schools.
