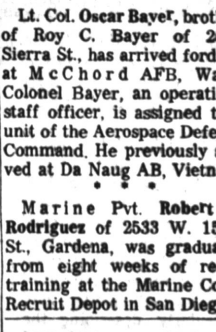

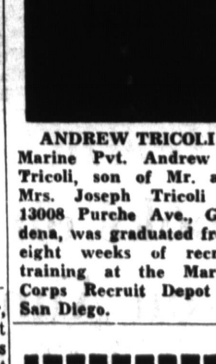

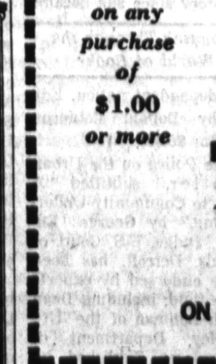

May a Big Month for Air Pollution Citations

More than 250 citations and the APCD has completed more than 2,400 court cases for violation of air pollution statutes.

Fines for violations were assessed by the courts in the amount of \$4,019 during May, which brings the fiscal year fines assessed total to \$47,029.50.

THE AIR Pollution Hearing Board completed action on 32 cases — granting 18 new variances, extending five and denying two. Two petitions were dismissed and five withdrawn. The Hearing Board also received 13 new petitions for hearing and met 25 times during the month, according to Hahn.

PROSECUTION of 234 violators by the District during May ended in conviction in 215 cases, Hahn reported. Nineteen of the cases involving excessive smoke from vehicles were dismissed by the courts upon presentation of correction of the condition.

Blatchford At Capital Conference

Joe Blatchford, victorious Republican contender for 17th Congressional District representation, was in the nation's capital to attend a four-day campaign conference of the country's top Republican leaders.

Beginning Wednesday, the National Congressional Campaign Committee conference brought together most congressional incumbents and those vying for the federal post.

Blatchford, who captured the Republican nod with more than 10,000 votes in the June 4 primary election, said he expects to remain in Washington a second week in order to meet as many congressmen and senators as possible.

In his first try for political office, Blatchford garnered approximately 34 per cent of Republican votes in the heavily populated district.



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County Bears the Burden Of Kennedy Assassination

Only twice in American history has a man accused of killing a President or Senator of the United States stood trial.

Today, world attention focused on Los Angeles County where preparations are being made for the trial of the accused assassin of Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

I have conferred with the County department heads who will be involved in the trial to make sure there will be no repeat of "Dallas."

When Jack Ruby shot down Lee Harvey Oswald the American people were deprived of knowing the full facts of Oswald's motives and deed. Questions remain.

THE SIXTH Amendment of the Constitution guarantees the accused the right to a "speedy and public trial" and the "assistance of counsel for his defense." This he will receive in Los Angeles County. As chairman of Courts for the Board of Supervisors, I have discussed the trial with Presiding Judge Donald Wright of the Superior Court and Presiding Judge Arthur Alarcon of the Criminal Court.

After the City of Los Angeles Police Department made the arrest of Sirhan Sirhan, it became the County of Los Angeles' responsibility, under State law, to provide for the custody and trial of the suspect.

The indictment was made by the County Grand Jury. The autopsy on Senator Kennedy's body was performed by County Coroner Thomas Noguchi. The suspect's security in jail is the responsibility of County Sheriff Peter Pittches.

COUNTY DISTRICT Attorney Evelev Younger will handle the prosecution and County Public Defender Richard Buckley is scheduled to provide the defense. County Clerk William Sharp is in charge of keeping all Court records.

The County Mechanical Department, under Robert Suduth, will provide extra physical safety facilities. Since the shooting, County Counsel John Maharg has provided

legal advice to all County departments. Coordination is being provided among the various departments by Chief Administrative Officer Lindon Hollinger.

The County Auditor, Mark Bloodgood, is making a detailed accounting so the taxpayers will know the full costs of the proceedings. Every effort is being made to see justice administered fairly and properly in this case.

IT IS INTERESTING, yet not surprising, that only two Presidential assassins in history have stood trial. Four Presidents of the

United States were murdered — Abraham Lincoln (April 14, 1865), James Garfield (Sept. 19, 1881), William McKinley (Sept. 14, 1901), and John F. Kennedy (Nov. 22, 1963).

Senator Kennedy was the second United States Senator to be assassinated. Senator Huey Long of Louisiana was the other, on Sept. 8, 1935.

Assassination attempts were made on the lives of Presidents Andrew Jackson, Theodore Roosevelt, Franklin D. Roosevelt, and Harry Truman.

The men who killed President Lincoln, Senator Long, and President Kennedy were killed shortly after their dastardly deeds.

Charles Guiteau stood trial and was hanged for the assassination of President Garfield. Leon Czolgosz, who shot and killed President McKinley in Buffalo, New York, was sentenced to death 12 days after the assassination and executed.
