Names 'Nurse of the Year'

Miss Dorothy Wessels, RN, an assistant head nurse at Harbor General Hospital, 1100 W. Carson St., Torrance, was selected as "Nurse of the Year" by the Intern Class of 1967-68. The announcement of the selection was made last Thursday by Dr. James Ryba, president of the Intern Class.

Miss Wessels' selection was the first of what will be an annual Intern Class program, Dr. Ryba stated.

The "Nurse of the Year," who lives at 3444 Carfax Ave., Long Beach, was presented with two dozen red roses by the class president. Later, the Intern Class will present Harbor General Hospital with a bronze plaque to be mounted on a wall near the Assembly Room.


Miss Wessels' name will be engraved in the first row of year spaces to be filled by selections of "Nurse of the Year" by succeeding Intern Classes.

In presenting the roses, Dr. Ryba told Miss Wessels: "Because of your integrity, sincerity and genuine concern for others, our Intern

Class of 1967-68 has selected you "Nurse of the Year." This class will donate a plaque to the hospital with your name engraved in the first space. A name will be inscribed each year by subsequent Intern Classes for the award of "Nurse of the Year."

Elizabeth Gray, RN, Miss Wessels' ward supervisor, said: "This honor is highly deserved. Miss Wessels is a very competent nurse. I know, as Dr. Ryba said, it was a very difficult choice, for so many are qualified. Miss Wessels is to be particularly commended for her determination to reach the goal she has attained."

The first "Nurse of the Year" began her career as a clerk-typist in Blue Cross in Akron, Ohio, came to Los Angeles in the same capacity in a private hospital. She trained at Long Beach City College as a student registered nurse, won her RN, and came to Harbor General Hospital to add immediately to its staff capabilities, as attested by her associates at the Harbor General facility.

Candy Striper Service Program Attracts Many Area Teenagers

Forty-seven girls from South Bay high schools are presently engaged in the Candy Striper program at South Bay Hospital, reports Mrs. Dorothy Armend, director of volunteers.

The girls are sponsored by the South Bay Hospital Auxiliary and governed by Candy Striper chairmen, Mrs. Alfred Beer and Mrs. Armend.

Acceptance in the program is determined by a written application and an interview by the Candy Striper chairman, at which time a statement that the applicant is in good health must be documented by a medical doctor.

The 16 to 18 year olds are awarded pins by the Auxiliary after 25 hours of service and for each 100 hours they receive a red star to sew on their uniforms. In addition, the Auxiliary awards a scholarship each year to a Candy Striper, who is planning a

career in a related health field.

The girls work a maximum of four hours a week during the school term and are allowed extended service hours during vacation periods. Areas in which service is rendered by the young women are Information Desk, Patient Feeding, Kitchen Coffee, Flower Care, Patient Visitation, Newspaper and Mail, and Central Supply.

"This kind of training is invaluable for young women contemplating any career," Mrs. Armend said. "These girls leave us with a high sense of self-worth and an ability to meet the public with real professional quality."
