
Candy Stripers Enrich Teen Age Image

They are at work in every department of the hospital except the emergency and operat-ing areas. They sprovide services during the evenings and week-ends primarily when Aux-iliary members are unable to give as much

Any girl at least, 16 years of age, with a "C" average in her school work and her parents' consent, may be considered for membership in this organization.

Last summer a group of the South Bay Hospital Candy Stripers were honored by being invited to participate in the Cancer Drive by riding on the "Cable Car" through South Bay Cities. Each girl receives an indentification patch and pin when she completes her first twenty-five hours of volunteer work. Then there is a red star awarded for every one hundred hours.

The South Pay Hospital Auxiliary has established a yearly Candy Striper Scholarship to be awarded for continuing studies in the field of health to a graduating Candy Striper.
