**REAGAN SAID** he believed the plan would provide the maximum effectiveness at a minimum cost to the public. In 1961, Governor Edmund G. Brown effected the first major overhaul of the state governmental structure in many years. The legislature authorized setting up four agencies and Brown set up four more by executive order. At that time, there was considerable controversy about including the department of agriculture with any other agency and it was left independent.

Reagan had criticized the agency structure during the campaign. Since then, he has tended to bring the departments into even a more com-pact structure. The four agency heads he set up by ex-ecutive order have formed his cabinet, along with the direcor of finance. The Business and Transpor-

tation Agency will include the departments of aeronautics, California Highway Patrol, motor vehicles, public works, banking, corporations, housing and community develop-ment, insurance, real estate, and savings and loan.

THE RESOURCES Agency will include the departments of conservation, fish and game, harbors and watercraft, parks and recreation, water resources, air résources board, Colorado River Board, the state water resources con-trol board. This is essentially the same as the existing re-sources agency. The agency also will include the office of nuclear energy, which re-places the office of atomic energy development and radiation protection.

The Human Relations Agency will include the departments of corrections, mental hygiene, youth author-ity, public health, health care services, rehabilitation, social welfare, employment, indus-trial relations, and human resources development, a new department proposed by Réagan

This agency also will include the service center pro-gram, the California commis-sion on aging and the state advisory commission in Indian affairs.

THE AGRICULTURE and Services Agency will include the departments of agriculture, general services, profes-sional and vocational standards, veterans affairs and the new department of commerce and the public em-ployes' retirement system, state teachers' retirement system, franchise tax board, and state fire marshal.

The proposal does not include a revenue department, which had been part of a number of previous reorganization proposals.
