Children saying "Come Take My Hand" have been heard by members of the Torrance Junior Woman's Club and many helping hands have been extended through the Headstart program for these underprivileged children.

Project Headstart is a program financed by the Federal Government through the Office of Economic Opportunity, de-signed to aid pre-school children from disadvantaged areas, who have not had the experience, medical care or opportunities of children from better circum-

In September 1966, Torrance Juniors began volunteering as teachers' assistants at a Head-start site which had been established in the Pueblo community within the city.

After a very successful year, suddenly the program came to an abrupt halt. Months of time consuming investigation followed, with the young clubwomen offering assistance to the Pueblo computity in finding available asset. munity in finding available prop-erty for another school site, meeting with the Council of Mexican American Affairs, Office of Eco-nomic Youth Opportunity in Los Angeles and the Torrance Coor-dinating Council.

Assuming a dual responsibility, the Juniors continued to strive for a solution to the Pueblo Headfor a solution to the Pueblo Head-start problem; and in September 1967, they began assisting at a new Headstart site, St. Mark's Presbyterian Church in Lomita, sponsored by the Federation of Settlements and Neighborhood Centers, Inc.

Three club members assisted with classes weekly, teaching, reading and supervising. Mem-bers helped escort the children on three field trips. A Christmas


punch, cookies, talking dolls and trucks, was a joyful "helping

The Federation of Settlements conducts cooking and English speaking classes for the mothers of Headstart children and an invitation has been extended to Pueblo area mothers to participate. Juniors will meet with these groups and encourage each of the mothers to attend.

In January, 1968, Junior club members were told by the Feder-ation that due to children graduating into kindergarten, there were openings for 12 children this last semester at the Lomita Headstart school. Most mothers of the pre-schoolers in the Pueblo of the pre-schoolers in the Pueblo area were willing to send their children. Transportation — juniors again extended a "helping hand" — and on January 29, members began transporting these children, now totaling 10, to class each day at 8:30 a.m. and returning them to their homes at 12:30 p.m. 12:30 p.m.

After consultation and extensive efforts to secure a small bus

sive efforts to secure a small bus or station wagon, a local car agency has promised to donate a used station wagon for transportation until the semester ends in June. The club has set up a bank account to cover mileage, insurance, and gasoline expenses. This group of active young matrons looks back on its Headstart involvement as only a beginning. Further investigation has made them aware of other areas within Torrance that need such assistance.
