### To Look At Costs By NATALIE HALL

City Councilmen may be having second thoughts about selling the money-losing Tor-rance Municipal Bus Lines. At last night's regular meeting, councilmen called on the city Recreation Department to produce figures showing how many people use the city's recreational facilities.

Councilmen Ken Miller requested the figures so local lawmakers could compare them with similar figures for the bus system. It has long been the contention of city officials that the bus lines are too costly in comparison with the small number of people who use bus facilities.

The bus deficit is now run-

ning about \$100,000 per year.

TO SOLVE the deficit problem, councilmen have voted to sell the bus system to the Southern California Rapid Transit District. Legal obstacles, however, still stand in the way of the bus sale.

Mayor Albert Isen, the bus sale's only avowed foe, noted that SCRTD operation osts per mile were considerably higher than local costs.

He predicted that the subsidy the city must pay to keep bus schedules as they are would continue to rise above the \$70,000 that will be the \$70,000 that will be charged the first year after the sale. SCRTD would re-quire the subsidy from the city in order to make up for the hugh deficit incurred by the system.
