Crime Commission Has Vital Role in County

 Recent nationwide polls indicate the public believes its major domestic problem is the war on crime. It is significant that the

public is aware and concerned over lawlessness, since the people must play a major role in the growing crime rate is to be reduced. The value of public awareness and public willingness to act cannot be overemphasized.

making its recommendations. The reports are turned over to appropriate city officials for action. If the recommendations involve county jurisdiction, the Board of Supervisors gets the recommendations.

Los Angeles County's Delinquency and Crime Commission, an advisory body to the Board of Supervisors in this area, is stressing the public's role as it continues to tackle major crime problems.

Since its formation two years ago, this commission has established itself as a hard-working body which is determined to get to the root of problems. It has made many contributions, but perhaps its most significant accomplishment came when it played a key role in quelling the civil disobedience on the Sunset Strip last year.

ONE OF the most vital programs instigated by the commission is the Community Inquiry Program, which places high value on the public and its role in the war on crime.

Under this program, the commission is conducting local studies of crime and delinquency problems in cooperation with cities wishing to dissect their crime woes.

The programs are locally planned, and they are controlled by residents of the community. The goal is to get as much public opinion on crime problems as possible.

The value of law enforcement judgments are taken into consideration, too, so that important professional opinions are not forgotten in attempts to gauge public opinion.

THE COMMISSION recognizes the importance of local autonomy. Nothing is more vital to the success of a community inquiry than involvement of knowledgeable local residents in analysis and planning for needed action.

Following interviews with key local people—the average public as well as the city officials—a public meeting is held. The inquiry "task forces" present summaries of their studies and make recommendations, with the general public participating in the discussions.

The Inquiry Board attempts to reconcile disagreements between the public and law enforcement officials before

IT SHOULD be clear from the procedure that the intent is to uncover underlying causes of crime and delinquency and to come up with sound recommendations for elimination of these causes.

Actions taken, of course, must be initiated by local government. To supplement this program, the commission is calling on trained volunteers to contact service, fraternal, and civic clubs, urging them to form and develop delinquency and crime prevention committees. These groups also are being asked to undertake problems to combat crime.

All of these activities emphasize one major point—much of the artillery in the war on crime must be supplied by an alert citizenry that is willing to act.

A REPORT of the West Coast Basin sea barrier project is being printed for area governmental agencies which require specific information on the program.

The object of the project is to protect underground fresh water wells from intruding salt water along a 9½-mile stretch of coastline from Imperial Highway to the Palos Verdes Peninsula.

Fresh water is injected to "block out" sea water which threatens the natural water supply of the Southwest area.

The report provides a comprehensive review of project operations, accomplishments, and costs.
