Specialist Wright is the son of Mrs. Iris V. Brown who resides at 22325 S. Main St.

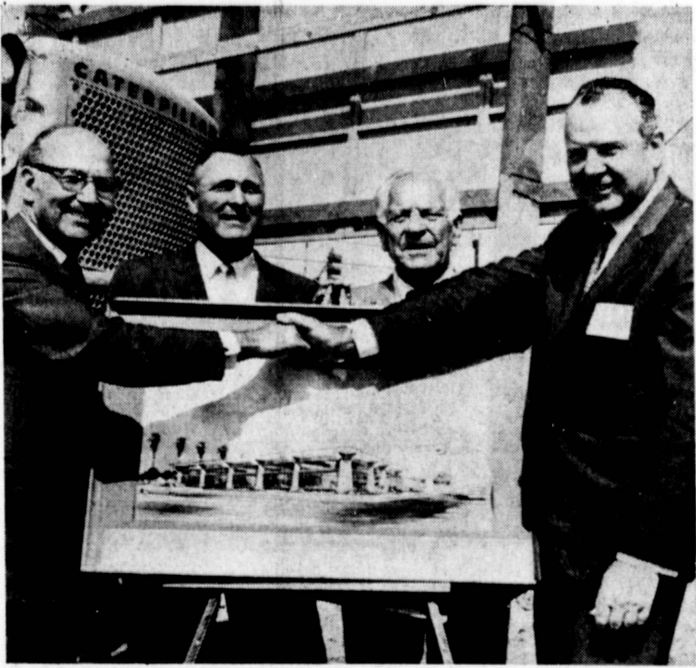

County Plans Huge Lifesaving Program

"Every Los Angeles County fire engine and fire truck carries a lifesaving resuscitator, but so des every human being," County Fire Chief Keith E. Klinger reminded today in announcing a massive mouth-to-mouth resuscitation program.

Demonstrations will be held at many public swimming pools, and private groups are urged to set up their own instructional sessions.

"This department responds to some 8,000 rescue calls every year, and most involve some sort of breathing failure or difficulty," the chief said. "Tragic accidents occur every day and many times a life could be saved if someone used mouth-to-mouth resuscitation immediately."

the first three minutes, a victim has a 75 per cent chance of survival. Chances drop to 25 per cent in 5 minutes.

A child in a pool, a baby or an adult choking, suffocation or electric shock victims often can be revived prior to the arrival of the fire department or medical help if someone starts mouth-to-mouth resuscitation at once.

"Swimming season is here," said Chief Klinger. "It would be tragic to think that a youngster might drown because no one nearby starts mouth-to-mouth resuscitation before our arrival."

IN COOPERATION with the county Department of Parks and Recreation, city and district recreation departments, and school districts, mouth-to-mouth breath-

demonstrations will be given at numerous public swimming pools, including

- Leuzinger High School Pool, 4118 Rosecrans Ave., Lawndale, July 8, 9, 17, and 18, 7 to 8 p.m.
- Carson Pool, 21411 S. Orwick Ave., Carson, July 8 and 17, 7 to 8 p.m.
- Victoria Jool, 419 E. 192nd St., Carson, July 9 and 18, 7 to 8 p.m.

In addition, homeowners with swimming pools who wish to get a group together to learn mouth-to-mouth resuscitation can contact their local county fire station and an appointment will be made for a fireman-instructor to come to a home pool.

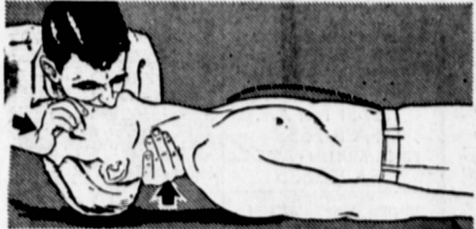
