Permits Worth \$3.1 Million Issued in June

Building permits worth some \$3.1 million were is-sued by the city during June, bringing to nearly \$16.9 million the value of new construction begun here since the first of the year.

More than half the value of the permits is reflected in new dwelling units under construction, according to a report just issued by John J. McKinnon, superintendent of building and safety.

McKinnon said a total of 104 apartment units-valued at \$1,278,040—and 21 nev-single-family homes—valued at \$636,645—were started under permits issued during the month.

CONSTRUCTION during Leave the past month is up considerably from June, 1967, when 306 permits worth slightly more than \$1.8 million were issued. The total value of all permits issued during the first half of 1967 was \$13.9 million.

Largest of the permits issued during June was one valued at \$616,330 for the construction of a 44-unit apartment building at 3708

The largest permit for a commercial building was issued to General Telephone
Co. of California, which is constructing a new facility at 22715 Hawthorne Blvd.

ALSO ISSUED during ALSO ISSUED during June were 29 permits for the demolition of buildings in the city. The permits were granted to the city of Torrance for the demolition of 29 homes and one retail store in the Meadow Park Redevelopment Area.

Torrance Collects Gas Tax

SACRAMENTO-Two tax distributions to cities and counties of the state were announced today by Houton I. Flournoy, state controller

The first was the June apportionment of high way users taxes. Of the \$51,495,567 distributed, Los Angeles county received \$3,786,389 and Torrance, \$90,818.

The funds were derived from gasoline and diesel fuel taxes, and by transfer from the motor vehicle fund, Flourney said.

The second distribution of \$6,815,579 represented 30 per cent of the revenue deposited in the cigarette tax fund during May, 1968.
Of this sum, Los Angeles county received \$173,600 and Torrance, \$54,723.

Nativity Priest Father Robert Ross, 34, was interred Saturday at Good Shepherd Cenetery, Hunt-ington Beach, following an 11 a.m. Requim Mass in the first assistant pastor for the

past year. The former missionary died Wednesday of an ap-parent heart attack, after resuscitation attempts failed.

ANOTHER assistant pastor, Father Rudolpho de la Cerna, told police he found Fr. Ross slumped in a chair in the church office, 1447 Engracia Ave. He said Fr. Ross was gasping for breath and unable to sneak

and unable to speak.

The priest was pronounced dead on arrival at Torrance Memorial Hospital

4:45 p.m. Fr. Ross was a member of the St. Columban Missionary Order, serving for seven years in Guatemala. He returned two years ago to accept a post at St. Cath-erine's Church in Avalon, Catalina Island, and subsequently transferred to the Torrance parish.

SETTLING in Orange County more than 25 years ago, Fr. Ross played a key role in the establishment of Blessed Sacrament parish and its ancillary parishes in Garden Grove and Stanton. In 1959, Fr. Ross gave up his position as bursar of the St. Columban Seminary, Silver Creek, N.Y., to serve in Guatemala.

The priest's lone survivor is Sister Robert Vincent, a Baltimore science teacher.
