

'Teen Art' Program Will Teach Jewelry, Ceramics

Teen art for those 13 to 17, a unique art program geared especially toward the teenager, will begin next Monday and Tuesday.

The program, sponsored by the Torrance Recreation Department, will feature three types of "teen art" classes. They are jewelry, art, and ceramics.

The jewelry class will begin July 23 and continue until Thursday, Aug. 22. Students will learn the basic techniques of handmade jewelry construction and will be given opportunity to make rings, pendants and symbols. The cost of materials is \$3.50 with a \$10 deposit on tools the students will keep during the class period.

Beginning July 22 and continuing through Aug. 22, a special art session will be conducted. Here is an opportunity for teenagers to work in watercolor, acrylics, collage, and papier mache. Classes will be conducted

Mondays and Wednesdays or Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30 to 5 p.m. The fee for the art classes is \$3.

A ceramics class will be conducted Mondays and Wednesdays from 3:30 to 5 p.m. from July 22 through Aug. 21. Teenagers enrolled in the ceramics class will be taught the technique of hand building with clay, and preparation and application of glaze in

the making of stoneware pottery. The student will also be introduced to the potter's wheel. The fee for the ceramics class is \$4, which covers the cost of all materials.

All of the Teen Art classes will be held at the Joslyn Center, 3335 Torrance Blvd. Registration is now being taken at the Joslyn Center, Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"Anyone who has lived this life relates that it's dull and degrading. And drug abuse is not limited to one ethnic or economic group; drug abuse occurs in all walks of life."

One section is devoted to laws affecting juveniles and adults.

Concerning juveniles, Younger states that they "are subject to the same laws concerning marijuana,

narcotics, dangerous drugs, and other violations as are adults."

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MWD Gets Funds from Bond Sale

United California Bank presented a check for \$85 million to the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

The check was in payment for the second in a series of general obligation bonds being issued to help finance construction of works for the distribution of Northern California water within the MWD's 4,750-square-mile area.

United California Bank was a co-manager of the syndicate which was the successful bidder for the bonds last month.

Arraignment Set July 22 For Youth

A Torrance youth faces Superior Court arraignment July 22 and preliminary hearings July 23 in Municipal Court on dope charges stemming from arrests May 31 and July 8.

Remanded to jail in lieu of bond was Mark Melvin Anderson, 20, of 3341 Crickwood St. Anderson was free on bail when he was arrested July 8.

When Anderson's car was stopped May 31 because of a faulty exhaust system, police found what they believed to be heroin and methedrene, along with narcotics paraphernalia inside the vehicle.

Police confiscated more heroin and four syringes when they arrested Anderson July 8. Arrested with Anderson that day was Peter D. Warwick, 19, of Palos Verdes. Charges against Warwick have been dropped, however.

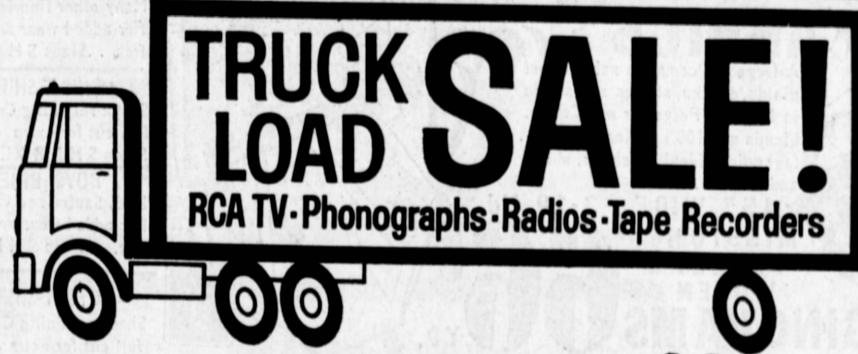
Station Robbed

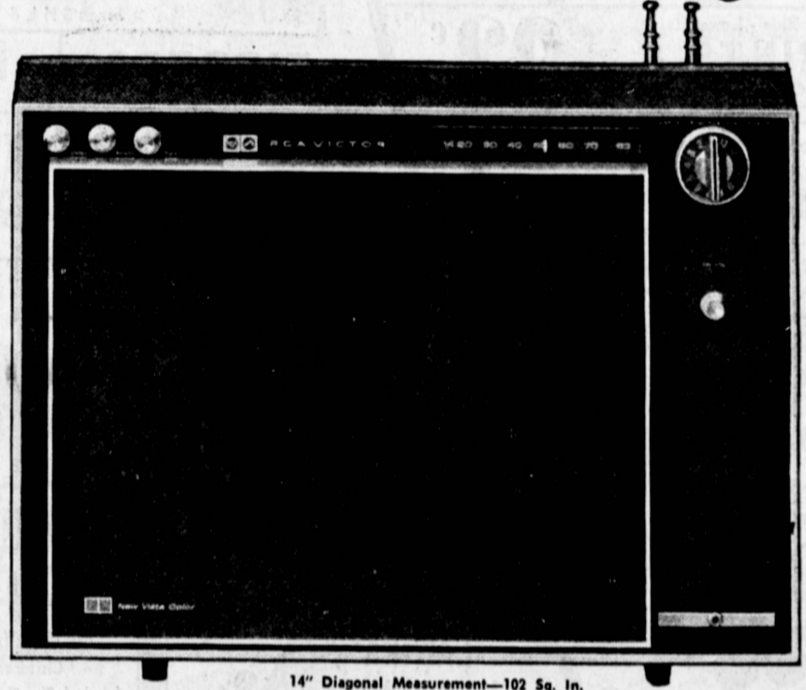
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
