THAT \$15,000 goal was reached this month—after nearly three years of planning—when S. Mark Taper, president of American Savings and Loan Association, contributed \$350 to the fund. fund.

Robert L. Reis, general manager of the Plush Horse Inn and chairman of the Riviera Park Committee, said the contribution brings

American Savings plans to construct a new Redondo Beach office near the park, it was noted.

RIES NOW expects con-struction to begin in the early fall. Plans, he explain-ed, were developed by Rich-ard McGowan, a landscape ard McGowan, a landscape architect, and are now being reviewed by the Redondo Beach Engineering Depart-ment. Torrance officials are expected to begin their re-view of the plans next week.

The two-acre site is partially blacktopped and has been an eyesore in the Riviera Village for several years, Reis said. The idea for making a park out of the area came to the fore when the merchants' association initiated a general beautification plan in the Village some three years ago.



#### Victim **Trapped** In Car

A 25-year-old father of five was killed early Friday when his sports car apparently ran off Western Avenue and slammed into a building.

Carl Whitmer (Rick) Tomlinson, of 2508 Sierra St., was pronounced dead on arrival at Harbor General Hospital at 1:09 a.m.

Police investigating the crash said no witnesses reported seeing the Tomlinson vehicle — a sports car convertible—until just prior to the crash. The car was first rectad police, reported. spotted, police reported, traveling across a parking lot south of the building at a "high rate of speed."

OFFICERS believe Tom-linson was traveling north on Western Avenue. They were unable to determine, however, where the car left

The car crashed into a newstand, hit a chain-link fence, and slammed into the side of a McDonnell-Douglas Corp. building near 223rd Street and Western Avenue. Officers at the scene said Tomlinson was pinned in-side the car and had to be cut free.
