## **Red Cross Tells Method** For Rescuing Swimmers

in which you may be able to help in a water emer-gency, according to Roger Plaisted, director, safety services, Los Angeles Chap-ter, American Red Cross.

But, he warned, a non-wimmer should NEVER attempt a rescue in water over his head. Even among awim-mers, only persons trained in lifesaving should attempt an actual swimming rescue. Here are some Red Cross

tips for rescues by nonswim-mers or those with limited swimming ability. When a swimmer is in

trouble near the edge of a

1. Lie down, extending the upper part of your body over the water. Grasp the victim's wrist and slowly draw him to safety.

2. Extend a towel, shirt,

pole or branch to the victim.

Brace yourself to a void being pulled into the water.

Use a steady, even pull to

draw the victim to safety.

3. Stand on one end of a rope attached to a buoy and using an underhand swing, throw the buoy beyond the victim. Draw the buoy to the victim and when he has grasped it, pull him slowly to safety.

If a bather steps into deep water, Red Cross recom-mends the following means

1. Wade to chest depth, incline your body toward shore, and grasp the back of the bather's wrist. Back-

of the bather's wrist. Backing up slowly yourself, pull him to safety.

2. Shove a board, plank or similar floating object to the victim. Get help to bring him to safety.

3. Row a boat to the victim and turn so he can grasp the stern. Row and tow him to safety.

to safety.

4. If you have rowed to the vicinity of a victim who is struggling, extend an oar to support him and draw him to the stern. Row to

nim to the stern. Now to safety. Having rescue equipment immediately available is the responsibility of every pool owner, Plaisted said. "A rope and buoy or a reaching pole should be located close to every pool, " he said.

At the beach where there is in an undertow or in a stream of swift shallow water, the human chain is an effective rescue method Each person grasps the wrist of the next person so there is an inter-locking grip among the rescuers.

## Area Automobile Dealers Work to Improve Image

"Operation Clen-up," just three years old this month, is the program initiated by the Better Business Bureaus in Long Beach, Los Angeles and Orange County at the request of local automobile dealers who were concerned with improving the image of the automobile business. The three bureaus, in co-

operation with their member dealers, drafted a set of Standards for Advertising and Selling. These standards became the framework for

The Long Beach BBB's auto division head, Don Lorenzi, points to an impressive list of statistics in citing the improvement in automotive advertising.

"IN 1966, the first year of the program, we investigated 773 auto ads for possible violations of the standards in the Long Beach, South Bay, and Harbor areas. In 1967, the bureau had cause to review only 135 auto ads. This represents a decrease of 82 per cent, glowing testimony of what self-regulation can achieve."

Thus far in 1968, according to Lorenzi, the incidence of violations would indicate that even fewer investiga-

tions will occur this year.
"The significance of these figures is that the overall improvement in the reduction of false and misleading advertising has been accom-plished by the efforts and cooperation of the dealers themselves, not because of governmental regulation."

"HOWEVER," said Lorenzi, "there still exists that fringe minority which is unwilling to abide by the standards. Their misleading advertising tices pose serious problems for the consumer and the image of the entire industry
