Around the World

Back to the land of Swiss chocolate and Swiss watches. It's a tossup which is displayed more frequently (or more elegantly.)

At Lake Lugano, Switzerland pokes a finger of land into Italy. A lovely lake in a bowl of mountain with swan-white boats going back and forth to the lake villages.

The main square at night is a stage set in soft yellow light. The cafe tables under colored umbrellas are set far into the street of square stones. The moonlit lake in front. Gray stone buildings and fountains splashing.

At the sidewalk tables of Gambrius on the corner, they serve dinner of Italian pastas, roast chicken full of rosemary and jugs of Swiss white wine.

"Can you advise us on tipping while we are in France, Italy, Switzerland, Germany?"

The custom of Continental Europe is to add a service charge into your bill. Usually 15 per cent to the room price quoted, add 15 cents for each dollar. Every time you order a bottle of water, you must add 15 per cent for service.

When I got my bill in Lugano, I noticed I was charged for phone calls the front desk made to get me taxis—plus 15 per cent for the service.

When you add up the total, you'll find your service 15 per cent is more than you'd tip in American motels. (But before you get hot, remember American hotel pay is concealed in the room charge.)

Now comes the moment of truth. In spite of this service charge (which pays the help), they feel you should give some measure of appreciation on top of it. Add two or three per cent and you'll find you have enough to give the maid 75 cents, the room waiter a dollar, the concierge a buck. (Based on three days to a week for a couple.)

This does it. Except—whose this character on the sidewalk? Ah, you've forgotten the doorman. So give him a half—The Last of the Big-Time Spenders!

Sales, Earnings Show 16 Per Cent Increase

Standard Brands Paint Co. today reported the best nine months in its history for the period which ended June 30. President Sid Greenberg said both sales and after-tax earnings were up 16 per cent after allowing for the federal tax surcharge.

For the nine months ended June 30, net sales were \$24,534,242 compared to \$21,093,486 in the corresponding period of fiscal 1967. Net earnings after taxes were \$1,622,780, equal to \$1.29 a share on the 1,258,517 common shares. This compared with \$1,397,471 or \$1.12 a share a year earlier.

For the third quarter, the three months ended June 30, net sales were \$9,230,316 compared with \$8,022,154 in the like period last year. Net earnings after taxes amounted to \$706,488 or 56 cents a share, compared with \$623,954 or 50 cents a share in the corresponding quarter of fiscal 1967.

Gemstones Donated To City

A collection of gemstones valued at \$15,000 has been donated to the Torrance Public Library by Mrs. Vern Cadieux of Santa Monica. Mrs. Cadieux and her late husband, to whom the collection is dedicated, acquired the rocks and minerals over a period of 30 years from many parts of the world.

The collection includes a group of fluorescent rocks that glow under a black light. The Torrance City Council voted to accept the gift and purchased Mrs. Cadieux's display cases for \$250. She will receive a permanent plaque resolution from the council thanking her for the donation.

City Librarian Russell J. West said the collection will be rotated among the several branches of the new Torrance municipal library system.

Water Main Completed In Lomita

Installation of a Lomita water main has been completed and is in service. Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today. The Board of Supervisors has accepted the work, as performed by Engineering Contractors, Inc., of Bellflower and authorized payment of \$7,450. The line was installed in 137th Street near Pennsylvania Avenue, Chace said. The larger pipe provided improved water service for residents of this area. The project was completed almost two months ahead of schedule, Chace said.
