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Social Security Not Just for Old People

Social security is for old people! That isn't the whole story, says Miles Davis, manager of the Social Security office in Torrance. For a long time Social Security has been paying benefits to disabled workers and the children of disabled, retired and deceased people, Davis said.

There are quite a few younger workers who have become disabled and had not worked long enough to receive social security under the old rules. The recent amendments to the Social Security Act make it possible for a disabled person, under age 31, to receive benefits if he has worked at least 1 1/2 years of the last 3 years before his disability began.

If you know someone who has a disability that is expected to last at least a year ask him to call the Social Security Office and discuss it. The Social Security Administration is concerned that there may be some young workers who are disabled and have not inquired about the new benefits, Davis said.

The Social Security Office is at 1408 Crenshaw Blvd. As a courtesy to persons who cannot call or visit during regular office hours, the Torrance Social Security Office at 1408 Crenshaw Blvd. is open each Wednesday evening from 4:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Earnings Increase One-Third
