last year for the Sea Festival Spectacular and Parade of Lights, far more than the civic sponsors of the event had anticipated.

The overall Sea Festival program will include na-tional and regional championship racing for sailboats, power boats, catamarans and trimarans, along with a unique "aquatics meet" of unusual swimming competi-tions, a downtown Long Beach area art festival, the eighth annual International Underwater Ph of corrapic Underwater Photographic Exhibition and a Country-Western music concert.
