

Regular feeding and irri gating of course are the first two "musts." Feed regularly about once every six weeks and if you want to give your lawn a real boost, try an all fish oil liquid fertilizer. In irrigating, always do so dur-ing the early part of the day so that the surface of the so that the surface of the lawn will have dried off be-fore sunset. Late afternoon watering will include fun-

The sod webworm is per haps the greatest culprit with lawns and you can prevent this pest.
