Following the program, guests will be invited to inspect the refurbished branch and enjoy refreshments which are being donated and served by the Torrance Junior Woman's Club.

Beginning Monday, Aug. 5, regular service hours at the library are Monday through Thursday 10 a.m. until 9 p.m. and Friday and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., according to Mrs. Lois Borman, head librarian at the Post branch. Mrs. Borman has been with the Torrance Library for the past 10 years and has participated in the opening of every new branch of the system.

West has stated that a reciprocal agreement with the Los Angeles County Library enables all county residents, including Lomita and Harbor City as well as Torrance residents, to use the Torrance Library System.
