Succession Bill Dies In Assembly

SACRAMENTO—Moves to alter the succession procedure to fill any vacancy in the lieutenant governor's post were defeated in the assembly when that body killed a proposed amendment which would name the speaker of the house to the post, and then defeated the original bill which named the president pro tempore of the senate as the next in line.

PATTEE HAD argued the line of succession could go to the speaker of the lower house, as it does in Congress. He was opposed by Assemblyman John T. Knox (D-Richmond) who warned the change from the present law would create problems in that the governor and the lieutenant governor could then be of different political affiliations.

Assemblyman Carl A. Britschgi (R-Redwood City), in a direct attack on the leadership of Speaker Jesse Unruh, said he could not "think of anything more horrible... than having (the present) speaker as lieutenant governor." Unruh was away on legislative business.

The present law gives the right of appointment of a lieutenant governor to the governor.

GEN. LOUIS WILSON JR. Gets New Post

SAMSO Official Appointed

Brig. Gen. Louis L. Wilson Jr., a veteran of 25 years of military service, has been named vice commander of the Air Force Space and Missile Systems Organization (SAMSO) in El Segundo.

General Wilson replaces Maj. Gen. Paul T. Cooper, who has been assigned as chief of staff at Headquarters, Air Force Systems Command, Andrews AFB, Md.

SAMSO, commanded by Lt. Gen. John W. O'Neill, is the primary Department of Defense research and development agency for ballistic missiles and space systems. As such, the Air Force agency has an annual budget of more than \$2 billion and is responsible for such systems as the Minuteman ICBM, nuclear detection satellites, military communications satellites, and a variety of space boosters.

GENERAL WILSON was graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1943 and is a veteran combat pilot. During World War II, he was assigned to the 8th Air Force in England and flew bomber escort duty. Just prior to D-Day, his 358th Fighter Group was transferred to the 9th Air Force and he flew close air support for the 3rd Army until the end of the war.

From 1948 to 1953, General Wilson served as a squadron commander, flying B-29s and later, B-36s. In 1953, he was assigned to the 8th Air Force Headquarters in Fort Worth, Texas, as Deputy Director of Plans. This tour was followed by two years as Director of Operations at Plattsburg, New York.

In 1956, he was assigned to Westover AFB, Mass., where he served first as Director of Plans and then as Inspector General. He became Commander of the 4081st Strategic Wing in Newfoundland in 1960 and, in 1962, was transferred to Headquarters, Strategic Air Command, as Chief of the Plans Division.

He was assigned to Headquarters, USAF, as Deputy Director of Operational Requirements and Development Plans in 1964, and, two years later, was promoted to brigadier general.

General Wilson's decorations include the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with 18 clusters, and the French Croix de Guerre.

Courts Consolidated In Torrance Facility

Plans have been announced to consolidate county clerk and superior court facilities in Ingleswood with those of Torrance.

Notices were posted last week in the Ingleswood Municipal Court building stating that Department M of the Superior Court and the county clerk's office would be relocated in the Torrance Superior Court building, effective last Thursday.

This means that superior court cases no longer will be handled in Ingleswood, and that persons wishing to obtain marriage licenses will be required to travel either to Torrance or downtown Los Angeles.

ACTUALLY, superior court sessions have not been conducted in Ingleswood for nearly a month.

Division M's presiding judge, Prentiss Moore, had been on vacation since the second week of July, and no one has been sent up from Torrance to substitute for him.

Decision to move the superior court department was made the middle of this month, according to Edward Kritzman, chief of the Southwest Judicial District.

KRITZMAN explained it was made because of the low number of cases sanded in Ingleswood during the first six months of this year.

He said that since the opening of the Torrance Superior Court building a year ago, cases have been heard in Ingleswood only upon request.

He said that Judge Moore has been presiding much of the time in the Torrance courts.

AS FOR the county clerk's office, Kritzman said it would not be "economically feasible" to continue its operation.

"About 95 per cent of its work load is related directly to court operations," he said.

He said that while the office has issued "a considerable number" of marriage licenses so far this year, quite a few Ingleswood area residents have traveled to Torrance to get their licenses.

He said it was officially decided to close down the Ingleswood office early last week.
