

# Red Cross Seeks 24 Lost Persons

Red Cross here is trying to locate two dozen persons thought to be residing in the Los Angeles area by friends or relatives outside United States who have contacted the Red Cross Foreign Location Inquiry Service for assistance.

These 24 inquiries are among hundreds received every year through the International Red Cross in Geneva, Switzerland.

They come from families throughout the world seeking to re-unite with relatives separated from them by war or changing world conditions, according to Mary McDevitt, Red Cross staff member.

INFORMATION regarding the person sought is usually sparse, Miss McDevitt said, more often than not it consists of a name, nationality,

age, and sometimes a previous address which is often very old or incorrect. Still, Red Cross follows all the clues, Miss McDevitt said, and is able to bring many families together, despite obstacles.

In many instances the person sought may be known by more than one name, as in the case of Ivan Mishanin or John Mitnin. His last known address in 1948 was 2710 Bellevue Ave., Los Angeles.

SANDOR NAGY, a young Hungarian man whose last known address is 5319 1/2 Hollywood Blvd., Hollywood, may also be using the name Alex Nagy, and may be employed as a film moulder.

The Paretski family—Mikhail, Celia, Stanley and Henrietta—may also use the

spelling "Paretsky." No further information regarding them is available.

Often, like Mrs. Martha Susnjak, who may use the name Susner, a sought person Americanizes the spelling of his surname.

Red Cross is looking for people as old as Victor Mironescu, an 80-year-old Rumanian, who resided at 552 Stanford St. in 1940, and as young as Bela Bakos, a Hungarian, in his 20s. Last thought to reside in Beverly Hills.

OTHERS sought by Red Cross are:

Josef Aleksza, in his early 30s, a Hungarian who lived at one time at 2420 Michigan St., Los Angeles.

Istvan Nyenyestay, also Hungarian, in his 50s, who may be employed as a draftsman, known to have

lived at 940 S. Oxford St., Los Angeles.

Mrs. Betty Evan Calderon (or her mother Mrs. Grace Steding) who at one time resided at 873 Cresswood Terrace, Los Angeles and lived prior to that at 1501 Crossroads of the World, Los Angeles.

Janos Borbos, a Hungarian of about 45, who once lived at 423 N. Harvard Blvd., Los Angeles.

Nkola Turcinovic, who has reportedly lived in Los Angeles since 1928, about whom no other information is available.

RED CROSS uses all possible means of tracking down these people, Miss McDevitt said, checking directories, former places of employment, previous addresses, and all available membership lists of organizations

to which they might belong. She is presently working to find:

Frank Hammerman and his wife Eva, who reportedly moved to Los Angeles from Ontario, Canada in 1957.

Laszlo Toth, a young Hungarian man whose last known address is 1220 So. Westlake Ave., Los Angeles, and who may be employed as a hotel worker.

Paul Juricov, a Czechoslovakian man who resided at 333 So. Pacific Coast Highway, Redondo Beach in 1959.

Mrs. Keilu K. Piaskowski, who at one time resided at the Blake Hotel, 1825 No. Beachwood Drive, Hollywood.

Laszlo Kotszin, a Hungarian who may be employed as an architect, thought to have lived in the Van Nuys area.

Albert Masip, a Filipino whose address in 1950 was 1649 W. Temple St., Los Angeles.

Mrs. Orlow Aleksandra, who lived from 1947 to 1952 at some address on Hyperion Avenue, Los Angeles.

## Rush-Hour Regulation in Sight for Weary Motorists

A test program of ramp control to relieve congestion during evening rush hours on the Harbor Freeway (Route 11) in Los Angeles was approved recently by the California Highway Commission.

The sum of \$52,000 was allocated to finance a system that will regulate the number of vehicles permitted to use the southbound on-ramps between the Santa Monica Freeway and Imperial Highway, a distance of

7.4 miles, between the hours of 4 and 5:30 p.m.

It is expected to reduce delays occasioned when too many vehicles try to use this section of freeway at the same time.

The southbound on-ramps included in the test pattern are located at Exposition Boulevard-37th Street, Santa Barbara Avenue, Vermont Avenue, Slauson Avenue, Gage Avenue, Florence Avenue, Manchester Avenue and Century Boulevard.

## Nursing Students Graduate

The first class of vocational nursing students at El Camino College have completed their training and are now eligible to take the state examination for licensed vocational training.

The 33 members of the initial class in the program received certificates last week in ceremonies at the college. The training taken by the vocational nursing students covers a concentrated 12-month period of course work and practical experience, according to Margaret G. Brant, nursing coordinator at the college.

Next application date for persons interested in vocational nurses training will be in October, Miss Brant said. The present class started its training period in June and will continue through June, 1969.

## Security Buys New Bond Issue

Security Pacific National Bank will help finance a \$1 million bond issue for the Torrance Unified School District.

Security headed an association which submitted the lowest interest rate in bidding Tuesday before the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors. Its winning bid was 4.193 per cent, and the second lowest bid was 4.220.

Other members of the association were Wells Fargo Bank, Blyth & Co. and R. H. Moulton & Co.

The Torrance bonds will mature from Aug. 1, 1968, to Aug. 1, 1988. They will be reoffered at yields ranging from 3.50 per cent in 1969 to 4.20 per cent from 1985 through 1988.
