

They have learned that checks sent directly to their bank are usually on deposit by the first of each month. or the same time they would be delivered to their homes. Webster said. However, if veterans are hospitalized, on a trip, or have moved, there is no delay in obtaining the proceeds of a VA check that has been sent directly to their bank, since the year write a check on their can write a check on their account at the bank.

Webster pointed out that all a veteran or beneficiary need do to have a VA check sent to his bank each month is to advise the bank of his intention and fill out a standard form giving the bank power of attorney to
