

## **Garden Checklist**


1. When cutting Dahlias for display indoors, pound the base of the stems with a hammer hard enough to crush them. This aids water absorption.

2. Native plants such as Ceanothus and Fremontia, and others, require very little water even during summer warm spells.

3. Keep Azaleas, Camellias, and Rhododendrons well-watered, especially if they are in containers.

4. Don't fret about powdery mildew on Tuberous Begonias. It is easy to control with spraying. Be sure the spray is recommended for Begonia mildew. Products containing captan will do the job.

5. Quick color can be found this month from Lantanas. Give them the sunniest exposure you can. Upright and trailing varieties are available.
