Basement Plan 'Expandable' Library **Wins Council Support**


Original plans for the proposed Torrance Central Li-brary would create a build-ing too small for local needs, city councilmen de-cided Tuesday night.

MYKONOS. GREECE going price on a full-length The white swan steamship Lito sails from Athens each natural mink coat is about morning at 8:30 for the blue sky, blue sea island of My-konos, five hours across the warm Aegean Sea.

Greece is inexpensive, thank heavens. I needed fithank heavens. I needed fi-nancial rest. Trailing three adults and two children across Europe is rough no matter how cool you play it. I've been bleeding shillings and lire, francs and Westmarks. But in Greece I begin to get well.

On Mykonos, the new Ho-tel Aphroditi's highest price is \$17 a day for two. That's a balconied, seaview room including ALL meals.

Good beach. No coral. No

seaweed. No surf. Sand bot-tom. Blue water at 70 de-

Food is fair to good. The Greek Tourist Office puts a ceiling on hotel rooms cut 20 per cent this year. So hotels make it up by getti...g more on the extras: liquor,

laundry, subs on the menu. Guests are mainly Greeks, French and Germans. (Big day last week: who should drop by but Jackie Ken-nedy. But she only audition-ed the bathroom (and it's not the Ritz, Fritz) and took off again.

You can step down that room price considerably. I talked to a young Englishman on the shorts. He had a no-view, single room without meals for \$1.50!

You can't beat the Greek lands. Now the action is

slands. Now the action is in the little town of Mykonos, a little Aegean fishing village. Thick-walled houses, whitewashed like


new snow.


