Keep Headlights Burning Over Holiday, He Urges

Last year, a total of 810 Americans died as a result of Labor Day weekend traffic accidents — 57 of them in California and eight in Los Angeles County.

Only the Fourth of July (a four-day holiday — 915 deaths) and Christmas (910) took higher tolls.

It is tragic that highway deaths increase during holi-

days, when families set out on the roadways for their happiest times.

EACH YEAR since 1961, the Board of Supervisors has sponsored a "Lights on for Life" campaign over the long Labor Day weekend.

All motorists are urged to drive with their headlights on both during the day and night Aug. 31 and

Sept. 1 and 2 to remind themselves — and to remind others — to drive carefully. This campaign has saved lives.

Approximately 40 per cent of the registered vehicles in California are in Los Angeles County. Therefore, it's reasonable to assume 40 per cent of the fatal traffic accidents would occur in this County.

Public Auction Slated Aug. 31

A public auction has been scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 31, by Baldo M. Kristovich, Los Angeles County Public Administrator.

The auction, which will feature a wide variety of items, is set to begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Public Administrator's Warehouse at 4524 Brazil St., Los Angeles.

General inspection is scheduled for 9 a.m. while jewelry may be inspected from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. The auction will last until approximately 6 p.m.

PROPERTY belonging to 50 estates will be sold at the auction, Kristovich said.

Among items to be sold are large selections of china, cut glass, and glassware, including Hummel figurines, Limoge China, and several pieces of English china; mantel clocks and a pendulum clock; ship equipment and surveying instruments; and an old Victrola.

Also to be sold are complete sets of medical and business executives' encyclopedias and a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica in a bookcase, physical fitness equipment, and various sizes of metal shelving.

KRISTOVICH said three color television sets, a large stereo phonograph, a tape recorder, and large camera light also will be sold.

Furniture to be offered includes a needlepoint rocker, footstool, and vanity bench; carved sewing cabinet; carved chest; several tables; a small desk; a large ornate carved antique bedroom set and various dinette and bedroom sets.

Hospital equipment, several paintings, a baby grand piano, as well as refrigerators, washers, a dishwasher, and a few automobiles will be auctioned.

JEWELRY, cameras, rifles, pistols, some furs, costume jewelry, and other small items will be sold at approximately 5 p.m., Kristovich said.

Items will be sold to the highest bidder and cash or cashier's checks must be presented at the time of purchase. All sales are "as is" and all sales are final, he explained.

The next regular auction is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 28.

THAT WAS usually the case on Labor Day weekends before 1961. In 1960, 14 of the 39 deaths in California occurred in Los Angeles County.

In 1961, as motorists turned on their headlights, the death rate on Los Angeles County highways dropped dramatically. Only 3 of the 37 Labor Day weekend fatalities took place here.

In the six years since, the percentage of Los Angeles County Labor Day deaths compared to the entire State has not neared the 40 per cent figure. (The highest was 29 per cent — 1962.)

LOCAL ACCIDENTS

In fatal motor vehicle accidents last year, 67 per cent of the drivers involved were residents of the community in which the accidents happened. The Greater Los Angeles Chapter of the National Safety Council said this stresses the need for careful driving in areas you think you know best.

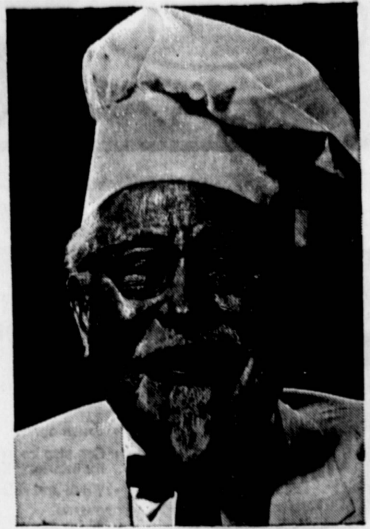
