I know one thing: we've done better with the concessions

But if you think we had a big crowd, I've seen other family groups in which the kids had to take turns playing softball, playing three innings, like they do in the All-Star game. My suggestion to them is that they ought to lease the Astrodome.

We broke a seasonal record last Sunday when we picknicked with a family known collectively—and proudly—as the "Crowley Clan," even though many of them have different married names. Of course, I may have counted a few strange heads among us in totaling the attendance, but it probably equalled out-heard later that some of our kids as well stood in line for cold soft drinks at the wrong picnic.

Because of the size of our group (and I wish people would stop asking if we were the Loyal Order of the Moose on an annual outing), a family picnic becomes a scientific operation. First, there is the matter of getting a table-a race comparable to Scott's attempt to reach the South Pole first. For as early as we arrive, someone else is always there ahead of us.

You can also be sure of one other thing: Be it the village green or a million-acre recreational area, the parking lot will be located as far away from the picnic tables as humanly possible. Thus, it requires an African safari-type operation to bring in the food. One thing, too, I've always noticed about picnics is that while all you do all day is eat, once home you can expect your kids to ask: When are we having dinner?
