# **Garden Checklist**

1. All container grown shrubs and trees may be set out in August. It is a good month, especially, to plant citrus.

2. Take long stems when cutting roses to renew the bushes. Feed roses if it's been four weeks or more since the last time.

3. Start sowing winter vegetables. Carrots, lettuce, radishes, broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower are all candidates.

4. Add color to sun decks, patios, and terraces by shopping for container plants in bloom. 5. Protect bedding plants from the hot August

sun for a few days after setting them out. Frequent watering will aid in establishing newly-set plants.
