Supervisor Kenneth Hahn has announced completion of all work on a North Torrance area storm drain prior to the upcoming winter wet season.

The project included unit two of project 5001 in Lawndale and North Torrance and portions of projects 1105, 440, 623, and 4001 in Hermosa Beach and Redondo Beach.

R. P. Burruss of Montrose built the facilities under terms of a \$746,051 contract awarded last October.

Hahn said the construction consisted of two short lines with one beginning in Firmona Avenue at 171st Street and extending south in Firmona to 172nd Street. The other starts in 173rd Street west of Condon Avenue and runs to Condon where it turns north to 172nd Street.
