"We will take a Caribbean cruise ship this winter and have no idea who you tip or how much. Somebody told us ten per cent of the fare . . ."

I've heard that. But if you take ten per cent of the fare on a long cruise, it works out at a fantastic amount of money. Military

amount of money. Military Sea Transport Service puts out a paper of advice on this. They say three per cent of the fare.

On this five-day cruise (average fare \$400 first-class), you tip your room steward, your table steward about equal. I asked four men about this and found they were tipping each stew. they were tipping each stew-

ard \$10. That's for a couple. You have minor tips: May-be a couple of dollars to the deck steward if you are asdeck steward if you are assigned a deck chair. (Not done on this ship. A couple of dollars a week to the wine steward if you use him a lot. Bar waiters are tipped by the evening service. As you would in a cocktail room ashore.)

"We hear some evenings are formal dress. Just what is required?"

Women seem to wear cocktail dresses every night. About three-fourths of the men wore dinner jackets. The others wore a dark suit. On cruise ships in the tropics, most people wear aloha shirts, slacks, shorts, sandals for breakfast and With Classified lunch. But I've found the Caribbean is more dressy

It's custom on all ships that no one dresses up the first night out and the last night before getting into

"We had thought of a winter vacation by ship but don't know whether we can spend that much time. Could we fly down and pick up a ship for a few days?"

I haven't seen anything offered like that. But there are cruise-down, fly-home offers by the shipping lanes. Particularly to the Caribbean, (I'm flying home from Langeli) Hawaii.)

The cruise ships can't compete with the airlines on price. Cheapest fare to Hawaii on this ship is \$240. compared to \$100 by jet. But you get a lot of action for the money: Five days at sea. Hotel bedroom. Three meals. Swimming pool, movies, dancing. It's a resort life at sea. at sea.

The shipping lines are The shipping lines are really competing with the resorts. APL is turning all their ships to cruise business. Starting new runs to the South Pacific, the Orient, Alaska, Acapulco and round-the-world. I roughed out the dally cert stranged. out the daily cost around \$1 8to \$28. Which is com-petitive to the luxury Amer-ican resorts.
