

• Follow a recommended system for better learning school. Most youngsters will find that they have six hours a day left for homework, and recreation. These

chores and recreation. These activities should be worked into the pupil's time chart. When completed, the schedule should leave plenty of time for both play and home-work. Once the schedule is completed, it should be followed most of the time.

A good study spot at home should be a place the pupil connects with study, not with play. It should be apart from tempting diversion: TV, radio, family talk, the tele-phone. The desk or table should have a study lamp which creates neither glare nor dark spots Only resterinor dark spots. Only materials needed for study should be on the desk. All distractions should be elsewhere.

The basic required working tools at home should be obvious—sharp pencils, paper, a pen, a ruler,, and a dictionary.


