By storing the gasses oxygen and nitrogen as dense cryogenic (ultra-cold) liquids in lightweight containers, signifi-(ultra-cold) liquids in light-weight containers, signifi-cant size and weight reduc-tions are possible over the older method of high-pres-sure gas storage in very light steel cylinders. 
