Reynolds led the Warriors in rushing, pass-receiving and scoring. The Morning-side High graduate rolled up 504 yards in 125 carries, picked up another 533 yards

on 32 pass interceptions and scored 96 points to establish a new college scoring record.

Fullbacks Ed Gilles and Art Ross are also returning to join Reynolds on the offensive squad, Last season Gilles had 141 yards rush-ing while Ross added anoth-er 126 yards to the cause 126 yards to the cause.

Adding strength to offen-sive Reynolds - Gilles - Ross trio is freshman Dave Boyd.


