

Patrol Hit by Wilson

Councilman Donald E. Wilson expressed his views about the proposed North Torrance Community Patrol at Tuesday's council meeting, warning of possible danger to patrol volunteers.

"We need to be careful that these citizens are work-ing closely with the police department," Dr. Wilson said. He commented that all volunteers should be trained and instructed by the Torand instructed by the Torrance Police Department before attempting to patrol local streets.

"Perhaps we should dep-utize them," Dr. Wilson

"We're not trying to discourage citizen participa-tion," hesaid, but added that it was wrong for citizens to assume the police depart-ment is not functioning properly.

The community area pa trol is currently under dis-cussion by the North Torrance Homeowners' Association. At a recent meeting, Association President Wil-liam F. Hunter expressed concern about the number of burglaries, car strippings, child molestations, and nar-cotics incidents in his area.

Local police have criti-cized the patrol plan, stating that untrained persons might be hurt by criminals or trespass on the rights of private citizens.


