No — it's what the youngsters will be wearing back to school this term.

Suedes, corduroys and fake leathers have found the most popularity with the school-going crowd. Vests also are making a particular hit with the teenage set.

And young women are finding the masculine look in clothes more to their taste. Wide pants; the aforementioned vest; skirts, ties and in some cases, that herb-dashery artifact, suspenders, are finding their way into feminine wardrobes throughout the country.

ONE DEPARTMENT store, not to be "out-fashioned," has added the Attic look — crushed velvets and such — to its fall line. What it all adds up to is that school fashion fads are taking a lot of "old looks" for new.

What of the lad who shows up in class wearing a cotton shirt and stay-pressed slacks? "That's like today's teenage boy wearing a crew cut," remarks one metropolitan clothier, looking up from his order book.

AMERICA'S ever-munching "sweet tooth" is grinding toward another excellent year for the candy industry.

Reed Candy Co., maker of Big Hunk, Sir and Look nought bars and Reed's hard candies, estimates that consumption of candy in the United States in 1968 will total more than four billion pounds — an average of 20 pounds of sweets for every man, woman and child in the nation.

Reed statisticians have calculated that this would equal the combined weight of 11,500 of the world's largest commercial jetliners, fully loaded with 2.3 million passengers, cargo and fuel. Or, if you prefer land-based comparisons, the mountain of candy to be eaten by Americans in 1968 would weigh more than one million automobiles, 10,000 trucks and 5,000 diesel locomotives.

ON A MORE personal level, an active 100-pound boy can be expected to devour well over one-fifth his weight in candy in a single year.

Parched throats throughout the U.S. are being cooled by a product called "slush," a variety of semi-frozen carbonated beverages. The substance spills from a machine in sherbet-like consistency and is served in a cup. Leading cola makers enjoying this new spurt in sales, are now supplying fruit syrups to more than 3,000 slush dispensers in stores and restaurants. Diet drinks and flavors do not lend themselves to "slush" because, having no sugar, they freeze hard. Regular soft drinks are turned to a near-ice beverage by the process, but still can be drawn by a soda straw.

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# Apollo Expert Calls For Global Thinking

What are the moral implications of man's ability to conquer space?

This question was probed by Edward B. Lindaman, Apollo expert and national president of the United Presbyterian Men, at an orientation meeting of Torrance teachers and administrators last week.

Lindaman, who is manager of Interdivisional Projects at the North American space division in Downey and who will host his second series of half-hour network television programs this fall, called for global thinking in the era ahead.

"IN A FEW weeks," he stated, "a representative of earth's mankind will be out there viewing his mother earth from a point in space as TV cameras from the orbiting Apollo spacecraft bring the view to all inhabitants of earth."

Pointing out that man is now able to use earth-sensing spacecraft for uses ranging from soil classification to crop disease detection, Lindaman said man has reached the point where he will have to alter his basic thinking about man-nature relationships.

"WE ARE approaching the time," he said, "when men the world over will have to gain their livelihood from the lowest common denominators of the earth's crust — air, sea, water, ordinary rock, and sunlight. Our new point in space hands over to us the responsibility for global resource management because such an inventory will be available. This must lead to new international cooperation, new national fiscal policies and priorities, whole new approaches to international law."

According to the Apollo expert, cultural and sociological impact problems will need working on by "a new breed of socio-economic-anthropologists with a flair for natural sciences." The global business administrator will need skill in form-

tion retrieval and data management in order to make mature judgment as to the use of data gathered from orbital sensing missions, he claimed.

"BEING ABLE to technically hold the earth up in our hands," Lindaman told the teachers, "raises the whole question of how the need for world community, world development and justice can be brought to the center of modern education. Education must be primarily concerned with the quality of life — all life, everywhere. This new concept of global concern must be learned intellectually against the pressures of many emotionally charged, competing loyalties."

"Just as will eventually be fundamental changes in our understanding of the universe by placing great optical and radio telescopes in lunar observatories," he concluded, "so too the exploration of space will give up fundamentally new mental and emotional horizons which our age desperately needs. Teachers hold a special key to that awareness in young lives newly christened by a view from a point in space."
