tions to dogdom. The breed takes his name from the Prefecture of Akita, located at the northern end of the island of Honshu, where he was developed primarily for hunting on that cold, rocky and, for the most part, un-desirable terrain. desirable terrain

The Akita was conceived symbol of good health.
