For those who will be attending the dinner and those who wish to try the Russian casserole, guild members have contributed the recipe, which is an unusual combination of gourmet ingredients.

RUSSIAN STROGANOFF
½ c butter or margarine
½ c onions finely chopped
1 clove garlic pressed or chopped
1 lb. ground beef
1 Tbsp. flour
1 6-oz. can mushrooms
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce
¼ c red wine
2 bouillon cubes dissolved in c of water
1 tsp. salt
¼ tsp. pepper
1 c sour cream
½ c Parmesan cheese
1 5-oz. pkg. wide egg noodles (cooked)

Brown beef, onions, and garlic in butter. Stir in remaining ingredients except noodles, sour cream and cheese. Simmer for 30 minutes. Fold in the sour cream. Place a layer of noodles in casserole, alternate with layers of beef mixture. Top with Parmesan cheese; bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
